By this "for educational purposes for children of color and of both sexes in Canada, apart from all sectarian of traditional dogmas." In a codicil the testatrix provided as follows: "I wish my executors or trustees to carry out my views in regard to the education of colored children in Ca-

nada by paying over the interest arising annually from the \$1,200 mentioned in the second item to such school or schools as in their judgment they may deem best, my desire being the benefit of such children of fugitive slaves residing in Canada West and other colored children who may be in the same neighborhood with them."

For a time the interest was paid regularly to the Wilberforce Educational Institute, Chatham, but this payment ceased many years ago and no claim has since been made on the fund which has thus been accumulating. The trustees and executors of the testatrix have all died, and the Provident Life & Trust Co. of Philadelphia have been appointed by the courts to administer the estate.
