5,000 People Witnessed the Coromony in a Drenching Rain-Marks Completion of One Stretch of the Trent Valley Casal. Distinguished Parliamentary Company Saw the Opening and Ministers and Senators Made Brief Speeches.

Peterbore, July 11 .- The opening of the hydraulic lift lock on Satura day marks another period in the development of the great Trent waterway, a series of cuts and natural channels which when completed will stretch from Midland, on the Georgian Bay, to a point on Lake Ontario yet to be decided upon. The two towns, rivals for the distinction of being the outlet, are Trenton and Port Mope. The importance of this route to the shipping industry may be imagined when it is stated that it is shorter by 500 miles, counting the return trip from the Soo to Liverpool, than the Welland Canal foute, and by 1,500 miles than the Erio Canal, which barge canal the State of New York proposes to expend \$191,000,000 to deepen, in order to allow the passage of 1,000-

ton barges. So far there has been expended on the Trent waterway \$4,135,353, and it will require at least \$5,000,000 to complete it from Georgian Bay to Lake Ontario. The hydraulic lift \$500,000, and there will be five others required to overcome the fall of

A Drop of 65 Feet.

The distinguished guests were carried to No. 5 dam, about four miles above the lock, where luncheon was served under a large marquee, about 200 sitting down; then the Stony Lake and Empress were boarded for the run through the lock. This was the first trip of any steam craft through this completed cut, the boats being brought down from Lakefield.

The success of the opening was marred by a drenching rain, which lasted from the moment the party left lock 5 until the drop of 65 feet to the stretch of water below was safely. made. But despite the great downpour about 5,000 people covered the fields in the vicinity. Peterboro was tessed in its best; the streets were beautiful with flags and bunting; the fair dames looked charming in lingerie of exquisite modes; and the craft below the lock were rigged in gay colors. No amount of rain could drive the spectators to cover, for the nearest shelter was a mile over the hills of Ashburnham. It was a day long looked forward to, and no true citizen would miss the historic

The Stony Lake was the first to be lowered, and as it entered the chamber there was much screeching and tooting of whistles. The gate closed, the chamber slowly descended and in one minute and 52 seconds the Stony Lake, with her distinguished passenger list, was ready to Steam out into the stretch leading to Rice Lake, and on to Lake Ontario. The steam yacht Rob Roy and R. B. Rogers' houseboat were raised simultaneously with the lowering of the Stony Lake, and when the chamber was emptied the Empress was let down.

As the Stony Lake steamed out of chamber Hants Logan, M.P., struck up God Save the King, and immediately after cheers were given for His Majesty, R. B. Rogers, the engineer; W. F. Francis, assistant engineer; Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Hon. A. G. Blair, and Collingwood Schrieber, Deputy Minister of Canals. There were brief speeches. Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Sir Wm. Mulock, Senator Kerr and Senator Cox each expressed gratification over the successful completion of the lock.

The steamers at once started for Little Lake, where there was another demonstration of enthusiasm, and the ceremonies were over.
