—Saturday's market was not as large as usual owing to heavy rains. Wool, washed, sold for 26 to 28 cents a pound, and unwashed 17 to 18. Eggs sold at 17 cents a dozen. Grain prices were as follows: Oats 36 to 38 cents, barley 45c., fall wheat 75c., goose wheat 70c., buckwheat 45c.

—The local C.M.B.A. will hold a garden party on the grounds of St. Mary's Parish Hall on Tuesday evening, 10th inst. Strawberries, ice cream, etc., served. Sylvester's band will be in attendance. Admission 10 cents.

—The game between the Peterboro seniors and the Y.M.C.A. of Lindsay, which was played in Peterboro on Dominion Day resulted in a score of 8 to 0 in favor of Peterboro. The first five innings were very even, but the electric nine proved too strong at the last for the Lindsay team.
