CATTLE MARKETS.

Cables Steady—American Markets Are Steady to Firm.

London, July 17.—Cattle are quoted at 10 1/2c to 12c per lb.; hogs, 14c to 15 1/2c per lb. per lb.; sheep, dressed, 14c to 15 1/2c per lb.

TORONTO LIVE STOCK.

Toronto, July 17.—Receipts of live stock at the city market since Friday, as reported by the railways, were 56 car loads, composed of 752 cattle, 259 hogs, 997 sheep and lambs, with 250 calves.

Exporters.

Few shipping cattle were offered and the highest price reported was \$5 for one two loads having been sold by McDonald & Mayhew at that price. Prices ranged from \$4.00 to \$5 per cwt. Export bulls sold at \$3.50 to \$4.25 per cwt.

Butchers.

Best lots of butchers' cattle sold at \$4.50 to \$4.65, few bringing the latter price; loads of good, \$4.25 to \$4.45; fair to medium, \$3.80 to \$4.15; common, rough and cows, \$3.25 to \$3.50; cows, \$2.50 to \$3.25.

Feeders and Stockers.

Few of either of these classes were offered, but plenty to supply the demand of the quality on sale. Transactions were slow, following quotations: good steers, 900 to 1050 lbs., at \$4 to \$4.25; good steers, 800 to 900 lbs., at \$3.50 to \$4.10; light stockers, \$3.25 to \$3.50; medium stockers, \$3 to \$3.25; common stockers, \$2.75 to \$3.

Milk Cows.

About 20 milk cows and springers were offered. The market for them was none too brisk. Prices ranged from \$30 to \$200 each.

Veal Calves.

The market for veal calves was not quite as brisk as usual. Prices for the bulk ranged from \$4 to \$6 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs.

There was a good demand for sheep and lambs at the following quotations: export ewes, \$4 to \$4.25 per cwt.; export hogs, at \$3.25 to \$3.50 per cwt.; lambs at \$7 to \$7.50 per cwt., or \$4 to \$6 each.

Deliveries of hogs were light.

Mr. Harris reported prices unchanged at \$7.70 per cwt. for select and \$7.45 for lights and culls.

EAST BUFFALO CATTLE MARKET.

East Buffalo, July 17.—Cattle—Firm and prices unchanged. Receipts, 25 head; active and steady, \$4.50 to \$7.50.

Hogs—Receipts, 18,000; best stags a shade higher; others weak to 5c lower; good to prime, heavy, \$6.75 to \$6.75; medium to good, heavy, \$6.00 to \$6.75; butchers' weights, \$5.80 to \$6.85; good to choice, heavy, mixed, \$6.05 to \$6.75; packing, \$5.00 to \$6.00.

Sheep and Lambs—Receipts, 18,000; steady to 10c lower; sheep, \$4.75 to \$6; yearlings, \$5.40 to \$6.50; lambs, \$5.50 to \$5.

CHEESE MARKETS.

Campbellford, July 17.—There were 1500 cheese offered. Sales: Magrath 450, Warrington 200, Gunn & Langille 400, all sold at 11 1/2c; balance resorted at 11 1/2c to 11 3/4c.

Cervona Seaworthy.

Quebec, July 18.—The port ward and Lloyd's agents completed their survey on the steamship Cervona yesterday morning. She is still making very little water, and is in a seaworthy condition. It was decided to permit the Cervona to proceed to sea, and she will leave under her own steam this morning without her cattle.

Glidden Tourists at Border.

Bluff Point, N. Y., July 18.—Revenue inspectors of the United States and Canada met the Glidden Trophy Auto Tourists on their arrival at Hotel Champlain yesterday. An official company met them over the Canadian border. This plan was arranged in order to simplify the customs formalities.

Driven on Beach.

Holland, Mich., July 18.—Heavy seas on Lake Michigan yesterday drove the steamer Gladys on the beach near Mac-taw Park, disabling her machinery. The life-saving crew rescued the passengers and crew of the beached vessel.

Battleship in Collision.

Norfolk, Va., July 18.—During a severe storm that swept the coast yesterday, the battleship Rhode Island was in collision with the Norwegian steamer Guernsey. Both vessels are said to be badly damaged.

The Statute Chapel, Rome.

The chapel is a beautiful piece in itself by its simple and noble proportions as well as by the wonderful architectural decorations of the ceiling, conceived by Michael Angelo as a series of frames for his paintings. Beautiful beyond description, too, is the exquisite marble screen. No one can say certainly who made it. It was perhaps designed by the architect of the chapel himself, Baccio Pontelli. There are a few such marvels of unknown hands in the world, and a sort of romance clings to them, with an element of mystery that stirs the imagination in a dreamy way far more than the gilded oak tree in the arms of Sixtus IV., by which the name of Rovere is symbolized. Sixtus commanded, and the chapel was built. But who knows where Baccio Pontelli lies? Or who shall find the grave where the hand that carved the lovely marble screen is laid to rest?

Etiquette Among Forest Rangers.

overlooked. I remember one fine Bell's, which my mother told Mr. Irving on the first night when he returned to our house to supper. People who have seen the play may remember that the first scene is a small inn and a deep fall of snow. The innkeeper, Matthew (Irving), walked in on that first night in ordinary black boots, with no snow upon them. My mother spoke of it, and afterward, Matthias, were high black boots and stood on the mat while the snow was brushed off. Remarks were made in the papers as to Mr. Irving's attention to the minutest details, and this was cited as an instance."

The Size of the Sun.
The sun, provided we measure only the disk seen with the smoked glass, is 866,000 miles in diameter—i. e., 108 earths could be comfortably ranged side by side across the disk. To cover the surface would require many thousands. To fill the interior we should need 1,300,000. On a smaller scale we might represent the sun by a ball two feet in diameter and the earth by a good sized grain of shot. Let the sun be hollowed out, then place the earth at its center and let the moon revolve about it at its real distance of 240,000 miles. There would yet remain nearly 200,000 miles of space between the moon's orbit and the inclosing shell of the sun. Indeed to journey from one side of the sun to the other, through the center, would take one of our swift express trains nearly two and a half years. So vast a globe must be heavy. Since its density is only one-quarter inch in diameter, it only weighs as much as 32,000 earths, or two octillions of tons. The attraction of gravity on its surface would cause a man whose weight was 150 pounds to weigh two tons.

IN HISTORIC GLENCOE.
Where Lord Strathcona Lives—Canadian High Commissioner Has Magnificent Property in Scotland.
Kinlochbeg, which includes Blackcorrie in the parish of Lismore and Appin and County of Argyll, has an area of about 40,000 acres. The small shieling known as Mealanrusch (Mealan Ruidhag), of triangular shape, which lies in the middle of the forest, forms part of Ballachulish estate, but is rented by Lord Strathcona, and Mount Royal, the proprietor of Kinlochbeg.

Twenty Merit Land.
Lord Strathcona's estate forms the bulk of what was in the seventeenth century known as the Twenty Merit land of Glencaon, in the old Lordship of Lorn, which formed the subject of a grant by James Earl of Perth to John Stewart of Ardsheal in 1685, and was then held in feu of the Earl of Argyll. In 1835 Stewart of Ardsheal subleased part of it to Macdonald of Achtrachan, and in 1893 another part to Macdonald of Glencaon, and he also seems to have feued other parts.

In 1761 he sold the remainder to Robert Stewart of Appin. Subsequently the bulk of the property feued to Macdonald of Achtrachan was acquired by the proprietor of the estate of Appin, and the proprietor of that estate also acquired from the Duke of Argyll the superiority of the old Twenty Merit land.

Twenty Miles.
Lord Strathcona acquired the lands which were feued out in 1692 to Macdonald of Glencaon, and also parts of the Twenty Merit land of Glencaon which formed part of Appin estate, including the superiority, so that

Lord Strathcona holds the whole property of the Crown. His territory stretches twenty miles from east to west; from north to south the breadth varies from two to six miles. The large mansion erected by Lord Strathcona was designed by Sir Rowland Anderson, and is understood to have cost nearly £50,000, including the laying out of the grounds. It is lighted by electricity and built on the old and historical property of Glencaon, overlooking Loch Leven, with Loch Linnhe in the distance, and the Morven and Kingairloch hills in the background.

Made Three Lakes.
Lord Strathcona formed three lakes near the house, and has made a special feature of autumn flowering shrubs and plants, as well as autumn flowers, vegetables and fruit. There is also a nursery of trees from which extensive planting is made every year. The landing pier for yachts is within a few hundred yards of the house. There are two shooting boxes, one at Coalhassan further up Loch Leven, and another in the middle of the Blackcorrie Moor. Blackcorrie was afforested early in last century, but Kinlochbeg, Coalhassan and Strone were cleared comparatively recently, and only after it was found absolutely unprofitable to graze sheep.

Land Lies High.
The ground is high lying, Glencaon being one of the most mountainous districts in the west. On the south side Bidean nam Bian (3,756 feet) is the highest; on the north Anach Eagach (3,188 feet), both favorite ascents among mountaineers. An outstanding member of the western group is Sgor an Ciche, the Pap of Glencaon, which lies behind Glencaon house and from the top of which there is a most wonderful view. Glencaon is entered from the west at Bridge of Coe, the village of Carluoch on the left bank, the river, which is the chief glenchan of the Macdonalds. The massacre took place on 13th Feb., 1692. "The Devil's Staircase" is a rough track across the forest from the Coe at Aiknafend to the head of Loch Leven. The Coe is the Coe of Osnian, on whose banks, according to tradition, the poet was born. Osnian's Cave is on the south side of the glen on a spur of Bidean nam Bian.
