Examinations--To Be or Not To Be

At the recent convention of the teachers of East and West Victoria held in Lindsay the question of the examination evil was freely discussed, and one of the most interested listeners was Mr. F. A. Reeds, who teaches school at Bethel. Mr. Reeds, who is one of the brightest of pedagogues, has always had his ideas on this subject, and writing to the Montreal Herald, (which letter is printed below in full) he says:

Sir,—Some time ago there appeared an article in the Family Herald and Weekly Star under the heading "The Examination Evil," that seemed to me to be one-sided in its arraignment of examinations. The plan to do away with examinations may be well enough in theory, but it will never work out in practice. Your writer says that "hereafter it is proposed that the chief end of the work of the schools shall not be the passing of examinations but the formation of character." Now, the formation of character is, as everybody knows, a very desirable function of the school, but just why character cannot be formed as well under the examination system as not I cannot see. We all know that the energy, the perseverance and the determination that the average student has to put forth to pass his examination are in themselves admirable traits of character, and traits that certainly will to a greater or less extent be lacking should examinations be entirely discarded.

There are two specific reasons why examinations should not be discarded, the first being the loss of valuable incentive to work. Let the teacher tell his pupils that they will have no examination in arithmetic, history and geography next midsummer, and then let him watch their interest flag in these subjects. Of course we know that people will say that the good teacher will enthrall his pupils with his own unbounded interest in his work that the incentive provided by examinations will not be needed, and that such incentive is of low value; but how many people even in the higher walks of life are there who are always influenced by the highest incentives?

Another reason why examinations should not be de-throned is that a too great responsibility would then
