FELL INTO A WELL.

Albert Brasier, the two-year-old son of Mr. Stephen Brasier, who resides on Melbourne-st., west, near the G.T.R. freight sheds, fell into an open well head first last evening about seven o'clock, and sustained serious injuries.

Mr. Brasier, who is a brick layer, was cleaning out his well, and he was at the bottom of it when the child fell in. The well is twelve feet deep, but the water had been pumped out.

The little child had been playing around the yard with his mother, and while Mrs. Brasier went into the house to get her husband a trowel, the young lad strolled over to the well and fell in head first landing in a pail of mud. The little fellow had been playing with some loose bricks at the top of the well, when a couple of them slipped from his hand and fell into the well striking his father on the head and shoulder and stunning him for a few seconds.

When Mr. Brasier came to he was shocked to see his child at his feet head first in the pail of mud. The child's mother arrived on the scene by this time with her assistance the injured child and father were brought out of the well in the bucket.

The young fellow received a severe shaking up, and a number of scratches about his head. Mr. Brasier received a gash on the side of his head and is suffering from a sore shoulder.

The accident was a very peculiar one, and the wonder is that the little fellow was not instantly killed.

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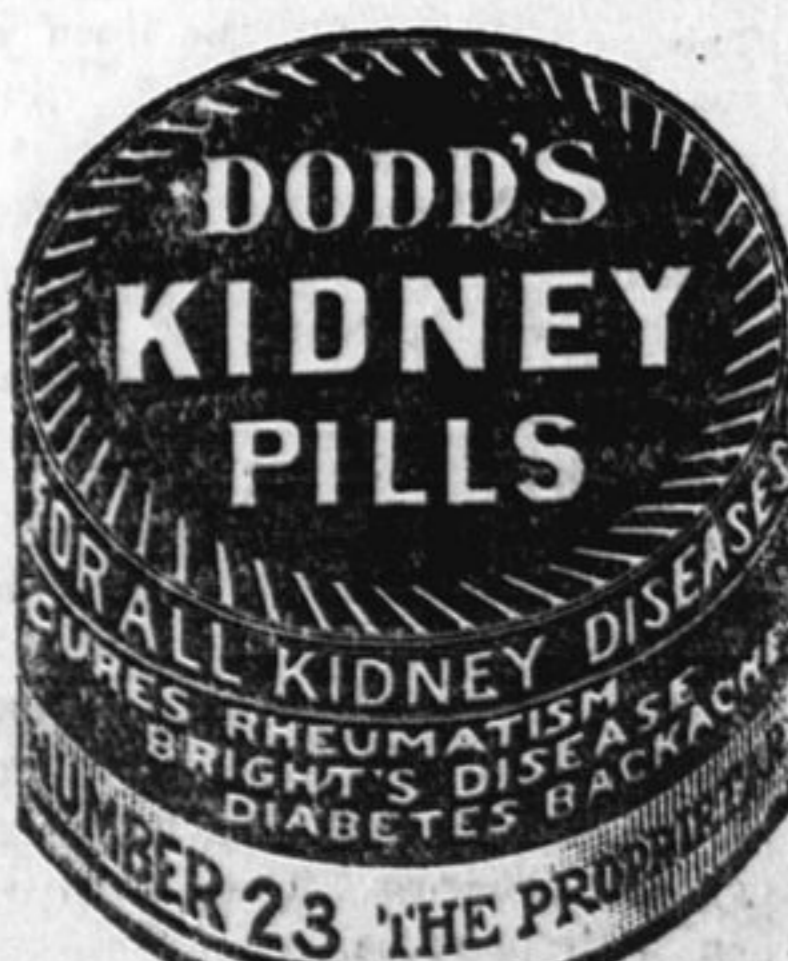
