MARIPOSA

Mariposa, July 15.—It is some time since your correspondent has forwarded budgets to The Warder, but fortunately to-day he has a few spare moments.

The crops are coming along fine, and are looking exceedingly well. Cutting has commenced in many sections. While it is not anticipated that the output will be as large as last year, an average crop is looked for. Red clover is now in its second bloom, and a better output than has been reported for some years is expected. During the past few years red clover has hardly been paying the farmers in this section, but it is now hoped that Mariposa will return to its old standard and bring the output up to former years.

Fined \$50 for Selling Liquor in Local Option Town

From Tuesday's Daily.

A Woodville hotel-keeper appeared before Magistrate Moore this morning charged with two breaches of the liquor law. The first was for keeping for sale intoxicating liquor; the second for selling it. The information was laid against the accused by license inspector Thornbury. He pleaded guilty to the first offence, and Mr. O'Connor explained that the cause of the liquor being found on the premises was that it had been a licensed hotel up to May 1, and the case of liquor that was found was in the cellar unknown to the proprietor. However, he was fined \$50 and costs, amounting in all to \$57. The second charge was for selling liquor on the 27th day of June. Malcolm McEachern was called by the prosecution, but did not put in an appearance, and the case was dismissed.

Mr. Hopkins stated that McEachern had circulated the report that the liquor had been sold on the premises, and that Mr. Thornbury had failed to act, but when summoned he had failed to put in an appearance.

An Instructive Agricultural School

Referring to the new movement in agriculture in Ontario and the work being carried on by the branch offices of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, the Canadian Dairyman and Farming journal has the following to say about the Lindsay branch office:

"Recently a representative of the Canadian Dairyman and Farming World called at the office of F. H. Reed, B.S.A., the representative of the Department stationed at Lindsay. The office consisted of two rooms. One contained a large table and numerous chairs. It was at the disposal of the officers of the local agricultural society, farmers institute or any other agricultural organization that might desire to make use of it. The other room was used

by Mr. Reed as his private office and contained his library of books relating to agricultural subjects. Copies of the leading agricultural papers and of the bulletins issued by the various departments of agriculture and agricultural experiment stations were on file and available for use by any farmer who might visit the office.

"While we were there a farmer called at the office and arranged to have Mr. Reed visit his place that day to give him some advice as to how a portion of his farm should be cultivated to obtain certain results. On the following day Mr. Reed was to visit a section near Lindsay to show several farmers how parts of their farms could be drained to the best advantage. Not long before our visit Mr. Reed had been consulted by another farmer as to how his orchard should be pruned.

"Last winter Mr. Reed arranged some short courses in agriculture, lasting several days, that were attended by several hundred farmers and that proved extremely successful. When we left him he was about to hurry off to the high school to look after some experimental plots he had there under cultivation as object lessons for the school children. One of the results of the work at

Lindsay has been the organization of a club composed of the breeders of pure bred stock who live in that section.

"The foregoing will give some idea of the nature of the work that is carried on by these branch offices of the department of agriculture and serves to show how valuable they may become to the farmers near where they are located. As veterinary surgeons are consulted by farmers whenever their live stock becomes sick it is desired that these representatives of the department shall be consulted by farmers whenever they desire expert information relating to any branch of agriculture but with this difference: there is no charge for the services.
