The twelfth of July celebration held in Fenelon was a huge success. The day was fine, and in the early morn our citizens were alive and busy decorating our pretty village for the occasion. The different lodges from the surrounding country met and headed by Woodville band, marched to the station to welcome the brethren from the north counties. The special arrived about 10 a.m. with about 800 visitors. The Esturion brought a large crowd from Bobcaygeon; also steamer Kathleen, from Lindsay and Kawartha from Cobocok. Both carried their limit of passengers. The estimate of the number of visitors for the day was about 4,000. This, of course, was not nearly the crowd that was expected, but owing to the smallpox scare, a number of people were afraid to venture so near. Mrs. M. H. MARIPOSA COUNCIL.

The council of the township of Mariposa met on Monday, July 13th, 1908. The members were all present and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Mr. William Keslick of Cresswell informed the Council that they purchased building some concrete walks on concession line 15, was not sufficiently deep to comply with the engineer's award respecting the Fowlers' drain. Mr. P. S. Mark was asked to see that the work was completed. Mr. Harrison and Mr. McNabb were present in respect to the Brooks drain dispute, in response to a notice sent each person interested in the Brooks and Campbell drains. A copy of a law 651 of the county of Victoria regarding the equalization of said county was placed on file. Mr. Hopkins, solicitor for Mr. Brooks, informed the Council that he did not feel like going to Oakwood to attend any more meetings and, evidently the great majority of the people concerned were similarly disposed. Mr. W. E. Yarnold, O. L. S. tendered his resignation as engineer for the township of Mariposa. The treasurer presented his half yearly statement of the receipts and expenditures of Mariposa, which was accepted as given showing the total receipts of \$5491.50 and total expenditures of \$5188.03, and having cash on hand of \$308.47. The report of the Union school sections equalization were presented and adopted as follows: Mariposa pays twelve per cent. in Union 1 and Union 2, 53 per cent. in union 3, 52 per cent. in union 4, 95 per cent. in union 14, 35 per cent. in union 20, 60 per cent. in union 20, and 99 per cent. in union 21. Tenders were received for the completion of the open part of the Dunn drain and the contract was let to Mr. David Harcus at \$3.00 per rod. Mr. Graham and Mr. Hardy were present in regard to the Hardy drain, and Mr. Washington was appointed inspector to see that the work is completed at once. The Reeve and Clerk were authorized to execute a lease for a gravel pit with Mr. J. A. McKay, being part of the north half of lot No. 16 in the 13th concession of the township of Mariposa, one quarter of an acre for \$125. Mr. David Tate was appointed pound keeper in the village of Oakwood, instead of Mr. George Coody, which did not seem to act. The Reeve was authorized to purchase a steel beam bridge from the Hamilton Bridge Co. to be placed over the creek at lot 11, con. 6. A grant of \$25 was given to assist in building concrete walks at Cresswell. The clerk was instructed to notify James Russel to see that all obstructions were removed from the Hancock drain. The Reeve was authorized to meet those persons interested in the expenses of the Brooks drain. A large number of accounts were ordered to be paid, including some \$800 for stone crushing, \$300 for grading and repairs, about \$300 for graveling and repairing bridges, some \$250 for drainage purposes, including \$179 for the Dunn drain, \$163 for gravel including \$125 to Mr. John A. McKay, for a gravel pit at lot 16, con. 13, after which the Council adjourned till the second Monday in August.
