Dr. Crippen in Custody on Board the Montrose

London, Tuesday, July 26.—The Daily Express without indicating the source of its information, says that the suspicions aroused on the steamer Montrose that the boy travelling under the name of Robinson was Miss Ethel Leneve, the companion of Dr. Crippen were confirmed on July 22, when the Rev. Mr. Robinson, other, wife Dr. Crippen and his ostensible son were heard discussing their escape from the police.

Captain Kendall thereupon sent several wireless messages, to which replies were received.

Then Captain Kendall and two of his officers arrested the pair on July 23, Crippen on the charge of murder and Miss Leneve on the charge of illegally impersonating a boy. The latter burst into tears when she was arrested.

Crippen was deprived of a revolver and cartridges and a penknife. The two are now in separate cabins and are closely watched.

Crippen declares he can prove his innocence.

Miss Leneve, according to the Express is in a state of collapse and is eager to make a sworn statement.

Enquiries have now established that Crippen and the Leneve woman spent all the time from July 10 to July 20 at Brussels, staying at an obscure hotel. Thence they went to Antwerp. They have not been in France at all.

Scotland Yard deprecates the certain assumption that the couple on the Montrose are Crippen and Miss Leneve. The detectives say, that nothing can be deduced from the fact that the female fugitive is dressed as a young man. Young women often dress as boys on a long distance voyage so as not to be separated from their fathers or brothers.

Inspector Dow is now aboard the steamer Laurentic, which is due to arrive at Montreal on July 29. That is the date also of the arrival of the Montrose, but the Scotland Yard officials hope the inspector will reach Father Point in time to arrest the fugitives. The inspector knows Dr. Crippen and the Leneve woman personally.
