Canadian Coronation Troop
Are Homeward Bound

The Warden has received the following interesting letter from Sergt. T. E. Prestige, of the 45th Regiment, who is at present in England as a member of the Canadian Coronation contingent:—Sergt. Prestige states that he is forwarding a couple of papers telling about the coronation, but these have not yet arrived.

In regard to the Coronation Sergt. Prestige says that everything went off without a hitch, except that a sergeant of the mounted troops was thrown from his horse and was seriously injured just before the procession started. Our troops (that is to say, the dismounted troops) were stationed just outside Buckingham Palace around the late Queen's monument and we had a splendid position both at the start of the procession and also at the end. The King afterwards came out on the balcony, when he was at once assailed with a deafening cheer from the Canadians, to which he at once responded. The young prince and princess also joined in with a waving of handkerchiefs. We did not

have a very long march, as was expected but only about three miles.

Today (Friday) we were at the same place when the King and Queen made their procession through the streets of London. I can not describe the magnificent uniforms that were worn and which consisted of all the colors imaginable. What interested our own men the most was the Drummer of the Bands of the Mounted Troops, to see the way in which they swung their sticks about was something marvelous.

The three men who went from Lindsay, Mitchell, Henley and myself, are in the heat of health, and are having a good time. We have been invited to and accepted the following places:—The Tower, Madame Taussauds, Hampton Court Palace, The Crystal Palace and Empire Pageant, and we have also free pass for any theatre in the evening, tomorrow (Saturday) June 24, 1,250 men go to Portsmouth to witness the naval review. Special trains have been provided for the journey, which is about 66 miles from London.
