BOGUS BILLS.

Inspector Parkinson, of the Dominion Police, has been in Lindsay investigating the circulation of bogus money and may return again.

A man named Wait was arrested in Orillia and convicted in connection with the prevalence of bad money, but some of the green goods is said to be in circulation in Lindsay, and other arrests may follow. Uxbridge, too, has had some of the stage cash.

A lot of bad money appears to have been turned out in Ontario recently and the Dominion police are investigating in several localities.

In connection with the above item Police Magistrate Jackson stated that he had heard nothing whatever of the circulation of bad money in Lindsay.

Lindsay's New Chief Of Police Will be John T. B. Chilton, of Ingersoll—Salary Fixed at \$900

At last! A chief of police has been appointed by the town council, namely, John T. B. Chilton, of Ingersoll, Ont.

The appointment was made at a meeting of the council on Monday night, there being very little discussion on the question. A bundle of recommendations were read and Mr. Chilton was appointed at a salary of \$900. It is understood that Mr. Chilton some time ago agreed to move to Lindsay. He is said to be fully qualified for the position and is also a man of large stature. Mr. Chilton will be requested to come to Lindsay as soon as possible.

Second Deputy-Reeve Dobson—"Believe me, that man I want a capable, sober, steady business all round man."

Ald. Horn stated that he had several recommendations regarding the ability, honesty and carefulness of Mr. Chilton, from business men of Ingersoll and Tillsonburg. The

commendations included one from the chief magistrate of Ingersoll, who stated that Mr. Chilton was a very efficient man for the position. A similar recommend was read from the chief magistrate of Tillsonburg. "I feel perfectly satisfied that a man could not get all those excellent recommends and not be a good man."

Ald. McCrae stated that he was personally acquainted with all those gentlemen who had forwarded recommendations and was satisfied that he was a good man.

Reeve Vrooman, who was in the chair, stated that at the last meeting he had made up his mind to support Thos. Ringland, who had all the qualifications mentioned for a chief, but as chairman at the time he had nothing to say. He came prepared to vote for Mr. Thos. Ringland.

After a short discussion Mr. Chilton was appointed and a by-law re-passed ratifying the appointment.

Uxbridge, June 28.—Without any opposing nominees, Major "Sam" Sharpe, M.P., and W. H. Hoyle, M.P.P., were selected by the North Ontario Liberal-Conservative Association convention to-day as respective candidates for the next Dominion and Provincial election.
