# MONTANA JACK'S THRILLING FEATS

A genuine portrayal of the life of the Western plains was the Young Buffalos' Wild West Show at Spratt's field Friday afternoon and evening.

The performers in the exhibition of wild West life number 150 cowboys, cowgirls and Indians, under the direction of Col. Vernon C. Seaver, of Peoria, Ill., a second "Buffalo Bill." J. C. Roy, more popularly known as "Montana Jack," of Billings, Mont., performed some truly wonderful feats in broncho busting. The "king" of the Western saddle, was the title given Montana Jack by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt. The "champion rough rider of the West," is another of Montana Jack's appellations. He rode the most fiery broncho with ease. Most people are content to sit upon the backs of ordinary horses, while they are going at full speed, but Montana Jack writhed and climbed all over and under them. Not less wonderful was his exhibition of rifle shooting. He lassoed horses by their heads, legs and even by their tails.

His was a very creditable performance, but his constant stalling and bowing to applause somewhat detracted from the merit of the act. A marvellous markswoman is Miss Anne Oakley. She elicited unstinted applause from the large audiences when with one rifle shot she broke five discs through into the air at once. Misses Julia Allen and Maud Burdick gave some splendid exhibitions of fancy and expert riding.

Miss Julia Allen and her dancing partner "Teddy" gave an excellent performance, her horse, which is only four years old and which was taught in two months, dancing the latest dances in a very clever manner, finishing up with a buck and wing dance. A feature of the whole show is the presence of a large number of genuine Sioux Indians. One of the chiefs gives a very interesting exhibition of bow and arrow shooting. It must be said that the band music hardly came up to the standard of the rest of the show. Taken altogether, however, the Young Buffalos give a most creditable performance, and large crowds were delighted on both occasions.

# WAS IN TROUBLE.

A young Cambay man was charged at Orillia on Monday, before Magistrate Clark with stealing a suit case. About two weeks ago the Cambay man, who, it is alleged, was somewhat under the influence of liquor, took a suit case from Holmes and Church's livery stable, which had been left there an hour or so earlier by another young man. The suit case, which contained considerable clothing, was found in his possession when arrested. After hearing the case, Magistrate Clark let him go on suspended sentence.

# Two Barns Damaged Near Omeme by Storm

Omeme, July 7.—About 5 o'clock yesterday morning lightning struck and set fire to a barn near Mount Pleasant, owned by Mr. Joseph Love. A colt, underneath the electric wire, was uninjured, but a working horse was stunned and lay writhing till the fire was half done its consumption, when the animal was dragged out and away from the flames. To the surprise of all who were about and talking merciful means for the poor animal, it suddenly rose to its feet and walked off in its usual fashion. The barn was entirely consumed, together with a stock of old hay and some few loads of new, a bin of oats, fanning mill, wagon and rack, etc. The building was recently erected, and was insured for \$400, and \$300 on contents, which will not

nearly cover the loss. The time for harvest is at hand, and the season for getting out timber is past, and to build now would incur an increased expenditure. The frame stable, one yard away, was saved by the valiant fire brigade of neighbors, the wind being favorable and the torrents of rain assisting.

Thursday morning's storm almost demolished a new barn of Mr. A. Ruth's, in the neighborhood of Hoate's church. Lightning hit the barn without firing it, and the strong wind tilted the building about on its foundation till it was a mass of twisted and useless debris.

The grand stand of the Winnipeg Industrial exhibition was burned last night.

# Heat Killed off Many Chickens

Heat fatalities in Lindsay and district up to date seem to have been confined entirely to poultry, especially young chickens, numbers of which are reported to have died as the result of the excessive heat.

Horses, colts and cattle, especially those out at pasture, are said to have felt the heat very much, but so far no fatalities have been reported. Veterinary surgeons report a good deal of joint illness amongst colts this season. One veterinary told The Warder that the disease, which is apparently of an infectious character, appears every season amongst young colts, and the number affected this year is not above the average, while another veterinary expressed the opinion that the number of cases was in excess of previous years. But so far there had been no fatal results. Many farmers, said one horse doctor, treat these cases themselves, and it is possible that deaths may have occurred of which the veterinaries have not heard.

# Laborers are Scarce in West

Winnipeg, July 8.—The Canadian Pacific Railway is rousing to a sense of its responsibilities in harvesting what at the present time promises to be the two-hundred-million-and-over bushel crop of the Canadian prairie west. It was stated yesterday at the company's office that a number of equities had been telegraphed to large employers all over eastern Canada, asking whether they could spare men. Answers received to date show that the labor situation is not encouraging. Instead of being able to spare men, employers say they have not enough to meet their normal requirements.

It is possible, though, that an altogether novel experiment will be made, of bringing from seven to ten thousand men from British Columbia points, mainly from Vancouver. It has been pointed out to Sir William Whyte that owing to the exceptional labor conditions prevailing at Vancouver a large number of men are out of work. The Canadian Pacific Railway has been asked to grant the same cheap harvesters' fares from the coast as are offered from eastern Canadian points. There is little doubt that these will be conceded, and that the prairie west in its hour of need will thus get help from the Pacific coast. Rates will be extended to Seattle and all points in that territory, reached by the Canadian Pacific.

# MINDEN WATER POWER.

Minden Echo: It is evident that the Lindsay people, with plenty of power for light and manufacturing purposes, have their eyes on the waterfalls of Gull River and tributary streams, where an abundance of water may be held in store and so controlled that a steady flow would be assured.

Behind these valuable water powers power at Minden Mills, considered one of the best in the north country, and are making enquiries about the excellent waterfalls farther up, where within one and a half miles from Minden Mills one of the best and most accessible water powers in this district lies undeveloped, to say nothing of those at Red Stone Lake, Hall's Lake and Buck's Slide.

Behind these valuable water powers are some of the largest lakes in the county, where the rates are already being conserved that a continuous flow may be assured down the Gull River, the height of lead feeder to the Trent Valley canal, some of the waters being diverted at Balsam Lake for the Kirkfield lift lock.

Recognizing the value of all this, the Lindsay town council has decided to request the Hydro-Electric Commission to send engineers to Lindsay for the purpose of going further into the power matter; also to ascertain the amount of power available back in Minden township.

"First come, first served," is a motto observed by many, and if this be true in this case, the time may come when Minden will wake up and find herself at the mercy of those who have stepped in ahead and obtained one of her most valuable utilities.

# Smallest Crops In Twenty Years

Chatham, Ont., July 6.—The honey crop this year is the smallest in 20 years, was the statement made by Chrysler, of Raleigh, today. "Climate conditions are for the most part the cause of the shortage. The clover crop ripened earlier than it has in ten years and the blossoms came at the time when the bees were not built up strong enough to take advantage of the flow. The period of bloom on all plants, trees and grasses was very short. Hasswood came out on June 25. This was much too early, as the clover and hasswood make up the mainstay of the bees. They did not get the proper nourishment. Honey this year will be a quarter of the amount of honey produced in somewhat better than it is in Essex and Kent."

# Will Likely Pay Dear For Stolen Ride

Two young boys were brought to the county jail this morning by County Constable Thornbury, from Bobcaygeon. It appears that these two young lads had broken into a stable at Bobcaygeon, belonging to Mr. McDonald, and taken two horses and the saddle. They then rode the animals for about ten miles, and it is said were returning with them when arrested, but the horse's hoofs were cut from the hard roads.

The boys, it is thought, took the horses merely for a ride, but they were arrested and will appear for trial, when they will perhaps learn that they cannot take what they want.

# Laying Rails on Section Near Cambray

The Toronto Construction Co. are getting the work well in hand on the new C.P.R. line now and it is being pushed on rapidly. They have about 140 men laying the rails toward Cambray and the steam shovel is working on the cut. The work at the camp north of town is also being pushed on rapidly and the rails will be laid in a few days. The Hamilton Bridge Co. have all their material at hand for starting on the bridge across the river, but work will not be started for a few days.
