Regina, July 1.—Regina is a city of the dead to-day. Flags float at half-mast and all celebrations of Dominion Day have been canceled. What should have been a happy

continued its disastrous course. The Methodist church was first. That handsome brick structure tumbled into atoms like a house of cards. Next came the new building of the Young Women's Christian Association. The Methodist parsonage was demolished and then came the Regina public library, a \$100,000 building, opened last March. Then the Presbyterian church was in a moment rendered a mass of ruins. The Baptist church is crushed in from the rear. Premier Scott's residence was badly tossed about and rendered untenable. Many of the large wholesale houses are a total or partial loss. Back of this district many of the comfortable homes of the laboring men working in the district were completely destroyed. The total loss to the city has been estimated between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000. The heaviest losers among the prominent business men are—L. V. Kerr, H. W. Laird, Capital City Flour Mills, J. S. Donahue, Ackerman, Massey-Harris, Toronto Type Foundry, Cushing Brothers, Tudhope-Anderson, John Deere, the Canadian Pacific Railway and Gaar-Scott.

### This Year's Wheat Crop

Taken together with the great amount of wet weather, and the three laps spring has been behind this season, one has often been inclined to ask if this weather was really intended for next spring or this fall. Still, there has been on the whole a lot of weather—of the kind—good, bad and indifferent, the latter two classes carrying off all the sweepstakes.

Seedling operations were delayed too by the all too generous rain fall, that fairly soaked the low-land, making it cold, and in many cases sour, while the absence of heat has not tended to improve matters in the agricultural and garden truck lines. There is one advantage, however, to the wet season—as "every cloud is known to have its silver lining"—and that is, the enormous hay crop promised this year. If we may judge from appearance the crop this year will be a banner one, and should be ready to be cut about July first. The price of hay will doubtless be cut in two, too, which will be good news to those who have had to "dig up" from sixteen to eighteen "rocks" since the first of the year to pay for one ton. Feed always having an important leaning on the price of butter, this staple commodity should be a reasonable price all the year.
