If one looks at the international t rade returns alone of Canada one w ould naturally expect an approaching money stringency and credit c ontraction for we find we have exported in 1911 \$290,000,000 and imported \$494,000,000, leaving out o f account gold currency and bullion, which leaves a deficit which we

we can estimate that English and foreign investors have invested in C anada the full amount of our adverse balance of \$204,000,000, plu s the gold imports of \$26,000,000. This at least affords temporary relief, but is by no means a final ad justment of the adverse balance aga inst us. "However, there is a more p ermanent influence operating to effe ct this adjustment in the fact that immigrants to the number of 350, 000 are coming to us annually, and if they bring on an average \$200 each it will amount to \$70,000,00 0 being brought in to replenish the system subject to these other leakages. Even this is not a satisfac tory state of affairs for it is equival ent to all new comers spending their entire capital abroad and la nding here penniless, whereas these n ewcomers impose an additional strain on our credit system. Ano ther favorable influence is that new lands are being opened up and new industries started which are produ cing new capital. How much this i nfluence will offset the other adverse factors is the thing that is difficult to estimate for there are n o statistical figures available touching on such matters. The p resent actual condition of money an d credit in Canada have the ap-

pearance of being sound and healt by. While there is a strong demand for money and a consequent careful scrutiny of all propositions before advances are made, there is no evid ence that legitimate enterprises are being held back for want of ac commodation. Call loan rates at t he leading financial centres range from 5 to 6 per cent., according t o the collateral offered, while disco unts and loans are at rates prevailing for some time back accordi ng to the place and circumstances o f same. If the occasional money pinch should be on the way, thos e engaged in speculative undertakin gs will be the first to suffer, while as is the rule of Canadian bankin g those conducting legitimate busin ess based on the needs of a definite


