THE ENTRANCE RESULTS

The results of the entrance examinations are now known, and the young heart that has been palpitating with fevered excitement for the past three weeks over how he or she would fare, can sit down and reflect on the errors of the past year and buckle on their armour to give another nine months hard work with a possible chance of success or failure once more.

Whether it is the fault of the teachers, pupils or parents, that many bright students failed to get the required marks, it is impossible to definitely determine but it does not prevent parents from drawing their own conclusions.

It is noticeable in certain schools, where pupils were invariably a failure, that the change in the teaching staff from year to year, has been ruinous in its effect on the pupils. The necessity of retaining good teachers, the very best, is being evidenced every year in the results of the entrance examinations. If it is necessary to pay higher salaries in order to secure the best teachers, school boards should not quibble over the remuneration, for it is remembered that it is a very serious matter in the life of a young boy or girl, especially the boy, to be "plucked." It not only means another year of hard work, but the pupil becomes discouraged. The value of a good teacher should be recognized by every school board and

parents who send their children to the public schools should back up the board in their efforts to retain the experienced teachers. If the people of the town and country schools know that they have a good teacher, they should endeavor to remunerate and pay the teacher what he or she is worth.

"How much are you worth above your neck" should be the motto held before every school teacher and they should be paid for their brains. Very often, and this is true in the County of Victoria, parents make the life of the teacher a burden by nagging, and as a result pupils are some times promoted through the lower classes and pushed forward to the entrance class too fast, and being unprepared are invariably plucked.

Changing school teachers from year to year also works ruin in the public schools, and the Wardens would emphasize that wherever possible, a good teacher should be retained at a good salary. Parents can draw their own deductions in cases of this kind. We must naturally infer that an experienced teacher will be possessed with the right ideas. He will be able to get the pupils under control and through his kind manner and up-to-date methods of teaching will bring credit to himself and crowning success to his pupils.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS

Scholarships Won by Miss Wanda Newton of Lindsay, and Miss Mable Borden of Norland

The following is a list of the successful candidates at Lindsay and the affiliated centres.

The total possible marks was 650. For a pass it required 40 per cent. on each subject and 60 per cent. of the total.

Certificates have been sent to the successful candidates and the marks to the unsuccessful ones. To guard against errors the examiners have re-examined the papers of those that were near the passing mark.

Those that secured 75 per cent. of the total marks, or 487 have been awarded honors and the certificates have been stamped accordingly.

The board of education, Lindsay, gives two scholarships, of free tuition for one year at the Lindsay Collegiate Institute, to the one in Lindsay and the one in the affiliated centres that takes the highest total marks at this examination.

This year Miss Wanda Newton secured the scholarship for Lindsay. Total marks, 549. D. McDougall, Central school, teacher. Miss Mabel Borden, of Norland, S.S. No. 1, Laxton, secures the scholarship for the affiliated centres. Total 539. Miss Nora N. Nichols, teacher.
