Milk Evaporation Plant May be Built in Lindsay

Bobcaygeon, July 16.—The results of the entrance examinations just published is eminently satisfactory so far as Bobcaygeon is concerned. Of the 21 who wrote the twenty-one pupils writing and twelve passing. Of the 21 who wrote the were sent up by Mr. Mills, principal of the public school here, and of the 12 which passed. These same eight are eight of that number, which is a very creditable showing indeed for Mr. Mills in his first year as principal. To those the prospect of a drouth like last year would spell ruin, but thanks to an all-wise creator we do not face that kind of a situation, for instead of the anxious, fearful expression there now sits one more optimistic and hopeful, and whether the cost of living remains the same or decreases there seems to be good reason now that it should not increase, and for which we will be devoutly thank-ful.
