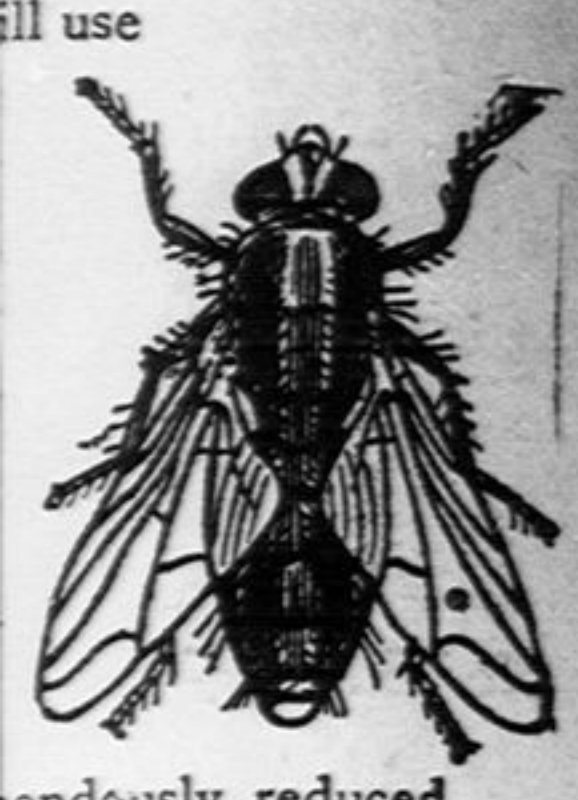

An Increased Demand for Eggs

During the past session of the Dominion parliament, Mr. A. G. Gilbert, poultry manager at the Central Experimental Farm, gave evidence before the select standing committee on agriculture and colonization on the development of the poultry industry. This evidence, which includes an address followed by questions put to Mr. Gilbert and answered by him, has been printed in a pamphlet form for public distribution. The subject is dealt with under the following heads: The value of the poultry industry; how the industry is tending; the attitude of the farmer towards it, and the force of development best calculated to help the farmer.

It is clearly shown that the demand for eggs in Canada has increased much more rapidly than the supply during recent years. In 1902 we exported to Great Britain, in eggs to the value of \$1,733,242; nine years later the exports had fallen to less than a value of twenty-five thousand dollars, while the imports of 1911 reached a value approaching half a million dollars.

It is pointed out that farmers are not taking full advantage of the high prices offered for strictly new laid eggs at all seasons of the year. The good profits from these are being secured chiefly by specialists who are often at the disadvantage of having to pay retail prices for feed. Much useful information is contained in this pamphlet which may be procured from the publications branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
