Detailed Account of Austin O'Brien's Sad Death-Former Emily Boy Killed by Live Wire-Body Hung Across Wires

Austin O'Brien, of Toronto, aged rope to the wire. In an effort to se 25, a Bell Telephone lineman, was curely fasten the rope around instantly killed one night recently at ) the corner of Queen and Blantyre ave., when he touched a high-tension wire of the Toronto Electric Company and 4,400 volts passed through his body.

The late Austin O'Brien was a son of Mr. J. D. O'Brien of Emily and was a very popular young man in Toronto and in his home community of Emily township.

It appears that the deceased young man was attempting to draw a telephone wire into place by attaching a

voltage current. In an instant the man was enveloped in a blinding tlash of tlame, as the wires coming together caused a short circuit,

which forced some 4,000 volts through his body. Owing to the fact that the lineman

wore his pole straps he was prevent ed from being hurled from the top of the pole to the ground. The flash attracted the attention of Foreman Alfred Barber and Timekeeper Teddy Voorhees, who at once mounted the pole and attached a rope around the unconscious man, who was hanging from his straps. He was lowered to the ground, and a telephone message sent to the Toronto, and a telephone message sent to the Toronto Electric Light Company asking for a pulmotor and a physician.

Although two doctors and the pulmotor were rushed to the scene, im mediately, it was found impossible to revive O'Brien, although the medical men worked over him for almost four hours. A peculiar feature the case is the fact that the only burn about the body was a slight scar on one of the fingers, where the current entered O'Brien's body.


