OPS COUNCIL

Ops council met July 21st at 10 a.m. All the members present. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Communications were read from: Thos. Hawkins, re a meeting on the Kennedy-Jones drain; from the G.T.R. and C.P.R., re road crossings; from I. E. Weldon, re water damage to the lands of D. W. Terrill; from Engineer Smith; from J. McGahey, gravel account for the season.

Interviews:—Mr. S. Oliver, explaining his position in regard to the fence he had placed across the 5th con. line, north of the town.

Mr. Thorn, re an advance of school money to S.S. No. 9, but as this loan was not for the purpose of paying the teacher's salary, it did not appear to be in the council's power to authorize the advance.

Mr. Knight, of the Agricultural Department, requesting a grant toward prizes for the Department's competitions for school children.

Mr. Michael Leddy, complaining of the improper condition of No. 1 drain and wanting council to go out and examine the same. Council agreed to go to see the drain on dismissal of the meeting.

On motion of W. Walden, seconded by G. Maloney, Mr. Best was instructed to look after the Patterson drain, lot 1, con. 9.

Moved by W. Walden, seconded by J. Brock, that a grant of \$5 to the Agricultural Department for prizes to school children be authorized.—Carried.

By-law No. 735, authorizing the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow money for the current expenses until the collection of taxes, was duly passed.

Moved by W. Best, seconded by W. Walden, that the Reeve represent the township at the meeting on the Kennedy-Jones drain on Tuesday, July 22nd.—Carried.

Moved by G. Maloney, seconded by W. Walden, that the following accounts be paid:—Patrick Welsh, for burying a nuisance, 50c.; John McGahey, for gravel taken from his pit, \$6.30; the National Concrete Co., for tile and gravel, \$22.50; A. Cain, for repair to grader, 50c.; office rent for quarter ending June 30, \$18.75; G. W. Beall, stationery, \$1.10.

Council adjourned, to meet at the call of the Reeve.

Drinking Fountain to be Erected on Lindsay-St.

In the near future a drinking fountain for man and beast is to be erected on the southwest corner of Kent and Lindsay-st., just around the corner of the old Y.M.C.A.

The question of having a fountain placed on this corner was introduced by Deputy-Reeve McWatters at a meeting of the town council held last Wednesday, a committee of Coun. McWatters, Beal, Kyle and Clarke being appointed to look into the matter.

The above committee met last morning, and after inspecting the corner and selecting a suitable site it was decided to have the waterworks attachment installed at once, previous to the laying of the permanent roadway, the fountain to be placed in position at some future period.

The fountain will be similar to the one at the corner of Kent and Cambridge-sts.

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Lindsay Should Separate From County of Victoria -Tax Rate Was Reduced

Lindsay's tax rate was reduced half a mill at a special meeting of the town council held Tuesday, the rate being fixed at 30 mills. The rate question having been discussed at a previous meeting at considerable length there was very little discussion last night.

Deputy-Reeve McWatters raised a strenuous objection which he would not take back. In part the deputy-reeve stated: "I oppose that rate because when our assessor went around he told people that if the assessment was raised the mills would be lowered. You are lowering it just half a mill. Make it a mill lower, say 29 mills. The town has more than \$9,000 taxes in already. How much difference will one mill make?"

Clerk Ray—" \$3,000." Ald. Irvine—"Let us pay our debts." After some further discussion a motion was passed instructing the clerk to prepare a by-law fixing the rate at 30 mills.
