Injured Bicyclist Clings to Motor

Brantford, July 29.—Prompt action saved the life of William Plumstead, a Mount Pleasant man, on Lorne bridge last night. As it was he sustained a compound fracture of the right leg and severe cuts. Plumstead was struck by a motor car, driven by P. P. Allman, at the western end of the bridge. Spectators were horrified when Plumstead, who was riding on his bicycle, and the car crashed together. Neither bicyclist nor driver apparently saw the other. The car crashed into Plumstead, pitching his wheel to the sidewalk. With remarkable tenacity the injured man clung to the radiator and spring of the car, which was traveling at twenty miles an hour. If he had been walking or standing he would have met instant death.

Girl Arrested on Murder Charge

London, Ont., July 29.—Carria Liley, a good-looking young woman of Dorchester, ten miles east of London, was arrested this afternoon by the county police, charged with murdering, or causing to be murdered, a male infant, her own child. The body of the child, which was born on June 14th, had been buried in the back yard of "Chat. Webster's place, where the girl had been acting as house-keeper. Inspector Reburn, of Toronto, is on the case.

KILLED BY TRAIN

WAS DRIVING COWS ACROSS TRACK ON FATHER'S FARM Wyoming, Ont., July 29.—A fatal accident took place this evening about a mile east of this place on the Grand Trunk Railway. Miss Norma Robertson, the youngest daughter of Mr. T. P. Robertson, a farmer living at the corner of the second line of Plympton township and the first side road east of this place, while driving some cattle over the track was struck and instantly killed by the accommodation train from Glencoe.

A DANGEROUS LOAD

LOCAL CARTER CONVEYED DYNAMITE TO BALSOVER. Tuesday Mr. J. Hutchison, the well-known local drayman, made the journey from Lindsay to Balsover with a load of dynamite, there being over 1,000 pounds of explosives on board. The dynamite will be used in the drilling operations in the canal at Balsover, and was prohibited from being carried over the lift-lock at Kirkfield, consequently the long haul by wagon to Balsover.
