THOMAS BEALL.

To Agree to the Suggestion for a Joint Commission.

New and Special Article in the Constitution Has Caused Consternation Among the Uitlanders - Everybody Will Have to Fight-The Situation Is Serious and at Pretoria a Gloomy View Is Taken.

Cape Town, Aug. 9 .- A despatch from Pretoria, capital of the South African Republic, says the Volksraad has declined to agree to the suggestion of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, British Secretary of State for the Colonies, that the effect which the Transvaal franchise reforms wil have on the Uitlanders should be in quired into by a joint commission. The Volksraad, however, consents to receive friendly suggestions. Will Make Everybody Fight.

London, Aug. 9 .- The Daily Mail publishes the following despatch from Johannesburg: "By a special article, added to the Grondwet (the constitution of the Transvaal), the President is authorized, in the event of war, rebellion, or other emergency, to proclaim martial law, and to compel every inhabitant of the Republic to bear arms in its defence. The Pretoria forts are being strengthened, and Boer agents are buying up all the available draught oxen in Bechuanaland."

Serious Situation.

All the despatches from the South African correspondents of the London morning papers take it for granted that the secret session of the Vciksraad, called last evening (Tuesday), will confirm the rejection of Mr. Chamberlain's proposal but leave the way open to continue negotiations. They also dwell upon the the addition to the Grondwet, compelling them to fight for the Transvaal, which scems to indicate that the Transvaal Government is expecting hostilities. The Times' correspondent at Pretoria says: "A gloomy view is taken here of the whole situation. Revolt in a French Colony.

Zanz ibar, Aug. 9. - Great Comorc Island is in revolt. The police commissary has been assassinated, and the Governor's residence is besieged. A gunboat has been ordered to assist the island authori ties in restoring order. The island forms part of the French colonial possessions.

China and Japan Allied.

London, Aug. 9 .- The Rome correspondent of The Daily Mail says the Italian Government has received positive confirmation of the report that China and Japan have concluded an alliance.

New Swimming Record.

London, Aug 9 .- The amateur swim ming champion, J. A. Jarvis, swam a mile yesterday at Leicester in 25 minutes 13 2-5 seconds, thus eclipsing the world's record held by J. Nuttall.

Carnegie Donates Again. London, Aug. 9 .- Mr. Andrew Carnegie has donated £10,000 to found a pubic library at Keighley. Yorkshire.

London Artist Marries Toronto Lady. London, Aug. 9.-Dudley Hardy, the artist, was married yesterday to Mrs. Lizzie Burnside of Toronto.

Another Whirlpool Floater.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Aug. S .- Howard Lake and Fred Preston of the Whirlpool salvage corps secured another floater from the maelstrom of the whirlpool yesterday morning. This one was the body of a young man, apparently about 17 years of age, completely nude other than a pair of white balbriggan half hose and a pair of black laced shoes, newly half-soled and heeled. The back of his head was very badly crushed. The body had apparently been in the water several weeks.
