

ELDON TOWNSHIP COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

General Business - Accounts Passed - Levying the Rate.

The Eldon township council held a meeting at Lorneville on August 18th. The members all present; the reeve in the chair.

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. The judgment of His Honor Judge Harding in the suit of Jock against the Municipality of Eldon was read.

On motion of Coun. Ross, seconded by Coun. Vanstone, Coun. McPherson was appointed commissioner to have the second culvert constructed across the road on 2nd commission line to the municipal drain, No. 1, as recommended by the judge's decision.

On motion of Coun. McArthur, seconded by Coun. Ross, the following accounts were passed and ordered to be paid: Duncan A. McFadyen, \$5 rods gravel, \$6.80; Duncan A. McFadyen, cutting brush on 1st sideline at 4th con., \$2.50; W. G. Nicholls, hauling plank for Bolsover bridge, \$35; Mrs. P. McDonald for gravel, \$18; W. Manning, for work and gravel, \$6; Myles Haygarth, for gravel, \$6.30; John Armour, for gravel, \$3.40; Chas. E. Ross, for measuring gravel pit, lot 18, con. 10, \$2; D. B. McArthur, for measuring gravel pit, lot 18, con. 10, \$2.

A communication from the clerk of Thorah on account of the alleged wrongfully diverting of a watercourse flowing from Eldon into Thorah. The reeve was authorized to confer with the reeve of Thorah for the purpose of arranging the matter complained of.

On motion of Coun. Ross, seconded by Coun. McArthur, witness fees in the oak suit were directed to be paid to the following persons as follows: Angus Ross, \$3.60; Donald McPherson, \$3.60; Kenneth Mathieson, \$3.60; Farquhar Stewart, \$2.60.

The council then adjourned to meet again at Bolsover on the 8th day of October next.

MARIPOSA COUNCILORS MEET IN SESSION Large Number of Accounts Passed - A Busy Meeting.

The council of Mariposa met at Oakwood on Aug. 13th, 1900. The members were all present except Mr. Suggitt, who was delayed a short time on account of rain. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Mrs. R. S. Flynt of Lorneville desired the council to recompense her for being detained at Mr. Hugh Graham's during sickness of scarlet fever in Mr. Graham's family, but the council contended they were not liable under the circumstances.

The petition of Mrs. Ruder, jr., in reference to opening Flors- at. was discussed in council, and owing to the danger and consequent liability of the council caused by a large open ditch in said street it was moved by Mr. Rich, seconded by Mr. McKinnon, that the council take no action in regard to opening up said street in the village of Oakwood.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Rich, seconded by Mr. Graham, that a grant of \$10 be made to John Cliff, indigent, in care of Mr. John Campbell.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Suggitt, seconded by Mr. McKinnon, that the treasurer be instructed to forward to the treasurer of Reach the sum of twenty-four dollars, being the amount of the award due in maintenance of the boundary line between Reach and Mariposa for the year 1899.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Rich, seconded by Mr. Suggitt, that an order be drawn on the treasurer for the sum of \$24.75 in favor of Mr. J. R. McNeill, county treasurer, for use of county crusher and gang of men to operate it.—Carried.

The council took up the estimates for the coming year, when the following appropriations will be levied for township purposes, namely: poor rate, \$400; roads and bridges, \$3,600; salaries, \$1,000; printing, \$200; law expenses, \$25; election expense, \$100; board of health, \$100; miscellaneous, \$200; total, \$5,625.

The council met at Coboconk on the 15th Aug., 1900. The members present were: T. W. Kague, reeve; Wm. Peel, J. Rehill, Peter Wires and W. R. Irwin, councillors. Minutes of last meeting were read and passed.

Moved by Mr. Peel, seconded by Mr. Rehill, that W. A. Silverwood be allowed \$2.40 interest in addition to the order for \$3.80, issued in 1898 in settlement of his claim.—Carried.

and the rate on the dollar will be 2 1/2 mills. The sum of \$4,871 for county rate and the sum of \$3,317.25 for general school rate and the sum of \$4,455.35 to be levied over the different sections, making a total of \$12,643.60, practically out of the control of the municipal council except it is their duty to pass by-laws authorizing the levy of these amounts, and pay them over to the county treasurer and the treasurer of the several school sections in the township.

By-laws No. 509 and No. 510 were duly read, authorizing the levy and collection of these amounts, and upon the third reading were signed and sealed.

The council appropriated about \$300 more this year than last for township purposes on account of several bridges requiring to be rebuilt or repaired. The trustees requisitions also amount to about \$400 more this year than last. Apart from these two items the taxes will be nearly the same as last year.

Moved by Mr. Suggitt, seconded by Mr. McKinnon, that the clerk be instructed to procure a proper register and post up all certificates of births, deaths and marriages previous to 1st July, 1898.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Suggitt, seconded by Mr. Graham, that Mr. McKinnon be appointed to look after the municipalities' share of clearing out the Grants drain.—Carried.

Meeting adjourned one hour for dinner and resumed proceedings at one o'clock. Mr. John Ham addressed the meeting, explaining the proposal of building of a hospital at Lindsay. The council expressed themselves in sympathy and approved of the project.

Moved by Mr. Rehill, seconded by Mr. Irwin, that \$7.50 be expended on junction road, Jacob Bartley to be commissioner, and that \$2.25 be expended on beat No. 23; also that two stone hammers be procured for Mr. Wires' beat.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Rehill, seconded by Mr. Wires, that a charity grant of 100 lbs. of flour be given to the old man Ansen.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Irwin, seconded by Mr. Rehill, that the following amounts be paid: Charles Simpson for sidewalk material and repairing Coboconk bridge, \$30; Pat Hannerian, repairing road, \$4; John Bowins, do, \$12; Walter Wilson, do, \$10; Henry Southern, do, \$10; Peter Cameron, do, \$5; James Rehill, do, \$2.25; Alfred Taylor, for drawing map of Coboconk, \$1.50.—Carried.

By-law 343, a by-law to levy a rate of 20 1/10 mills in the \$, and a special rate on the school sections sufficient to raise the following amounts: U. S. section No. 9, \$100; u. s. section No. 2, \$119.47; section No. 3, \$110; s. No. 8, \$125; u. s. section No. 1, \$202; s. section No. 6, \$90; u. s. section No. 10, 20c.; and the sum of \$39.25, cost of registering certain lots in the village of Victoria Road, be levied against said lots was passed.

By-law No. 344, to appoint a collector, was passed.
