A pound of cheese was made from 11.2 lbs. milk. The average test of milk, 3.39. The cheese for the first half of the month was sold at 9 1/2 cents and for the second half 11 cents. The net price to patrons was 7.9 cents per lb. and 70.4 cents per 100 for their milk.
