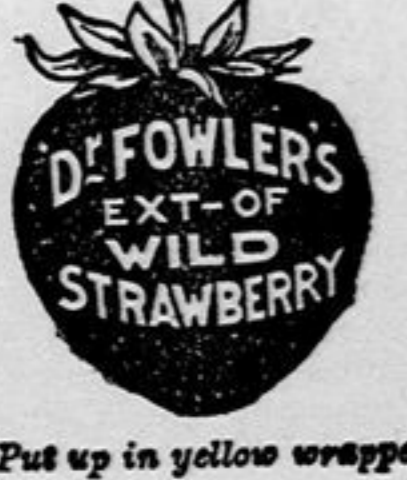

**SEWERAGE SCHEMES UNDER DISCUSSION**  
**MEETING OF GENERAL COMMITTEE OF COUNCIL**

**Communications and Finance Matters—A Sad Case**  
The regular meeting of the city fathers was held in the council chamber on Monday evening. Mayor Ingle in the chair, and the following members present: Aldermen Hore, Jackson, O'Reilly, Robson and Touchburn. The minutes of former meetings were read and approved.

**Communications**  
Clerk Knowlson read the following communications:  
From Mrs. E. E. Sharpe, secretary for the Home for the Aged, requesting council to relieve the home of inmate Wm. Reynolds, who is of unsound mind.—Finance committee with power to act.  
From Mr. G. H. Hopkins, secretary of the Board of Water Commissioners, requesting that the \$4,000 debentures granted to extend the water works be issued and sold without delay in order to meet the expenses already incurred.—Finance committee with power to act.  
From Mr. G. H. Hopkins, town solicitor, stating that Mr. Burgess, of the Lindsay Gas Company, desired to meet the council, or a committee thereof, on Wednesday morning to proceed to locate the gas mains.—On motion the Police and Light Committee were authorized to meet Mr. Burgess, as per request.  
From Mr. S. Tucker complaining of stagnant water standing in front of his property on Russell-st.—Board of Works.

From Mr. O. Bigelow, asking that a lateral drain be placed to his property on the corner of Lindsay and Russell-sts. from the Russell-st. sewer.—Board of Works.  
From Mr. W. T. Romage, asking what inducements the town would offer for a foundry.—Finance.  
From the President of the Ontario Municipal Association, stating that the association will meet at Toronto on the 11th and 12th September next to discuss the protection of municipalities from the encroachments of incorporations and requesting the council to send representatives.—Finance.

From the Mayor of Ottawa, with reference to the protection of municipalities from encroachments of corporation matters.—Finance.  
From the Royal Carpet Company asking what inducements the town would offer for the location of their factory in the town of Lindsay.—Board of Trade.  
From A. E. Ames & Co., Toronto, offering to purchase the \$9,000 debentures privately.—Finance.

After the Delinquents  
Ald. O'Reilly inquired if the collector had sent in a communication. Clerk Knowlson.—There is a statement.  
**Petitions Mean Trouble**  
A cross petition was read from A. Brooks and others asking that the petition for a sewer on Simcoe-st. be not entertained.  
On motion Mr. John McSweyn stated he was present in the interests of the cross-petitioners, but did not know to what extent the proceedings had reached.  
Ald. Jackson explained that the petition had been received in good faith by council and duly submitted to the commissioner, who in turn reported favorably to the council and the report was confirmed in council and the court of revision had been advertised.  
Solicitor McSweyn pointed out that two of the names on the cross petition were also on the first petition. He maintained that the petitioners had the right to have their names removed before the proceedings had

gone too far. He also pointed out that there was now a minority of valid property owners for the original petition, but he could not state how it would apply to the value of the properties interested. He was of the opinion that the council should move slow in the matter and suggested that they hold the matter in abeyance.  
Ald. Jackson pointed out the similarity to the Colborne-st. sewer and suggested that the matter should go before the judge.  
Referred to the Board of Works with instructions to notify all interested.

**The Kent-st. Sewer**  
A petition signed by twenty-three property owners requested a sewer on Kent-st. from Angeline to Cambridge-st. was read and on motion received and ordered to be handed to the clerk and if found correct to be submitted to Street Commissioner Chalmers to report thereon.  
**The Colborne-st. Sewer**  
A second cross-petition was read from a number of property owners on Colborne-st. objecting to council granting a sewer to the former petitioners.

Ald. Jackson suggested that the petition be sent to the court of revision and that all the interested parties be invited to attend.  
Ald. O'Reilly pointed out that according to the ruling of the town solicitor the court of revision could only deal with the assessment.  
Mr. Hunter pointed out that the first petition was illegal. He was not there to speak for the property owners, as it was now in the hands of solicitor Anderson, who was unable to be present. He warned the council that if they proceeded with the first petition they would do so at their own risk, for it would not end there, as the property owners intended to fight it out to the bitter end. He explained how the signatures had been obtained by misrepresentation on the part of the promoters and when the ratemakers found it out they went before the committee and were told it would be settled at the court of revision. Then when they went there they were told that the court could have nothing to do with it. The petition had been secured by duplicity and he warned council against attempting to force it on the people.

Ald. Robson thought they should get the advice of their solicitor.  
Ald. O'Reilly pointed out that they already had the opinion of the solicitor.  
Ald. Jackson pointed out that they had received the petition in good faith and had given it the same procedure that they gave other petitions, and if people signed petitions without knowing what they were doing the council were not to blame. They could take the whole matter before the judge.

Mr. Hunter referred to the manner in which a majority of the property owners had been secured by the removal of the name of Chas. Graham. Mr. Graham.  
Mr. Graham was the owner and had voted on a money-by-law a few days after. He again warned the council of the danger of lengthy litigation if they went on with the work. Mr. Graham was a property owner and they would prove it later on. They had secured six new names on the cross-petition and only four property owners were now in favor of it.

Ald. Touchburn felt they were not sure of their ground. They should move slow and not take any chances of an expensive law suit. He favored sending the matter to the court of revision.  
Ald. O'Reilly was opposed to referring the matter back to the court of revision as that body had no power to deal with anything outside the assessment. He quoted solicitor Hopkins' opinion and the opinions advanced by Messrs. Anderson and O'Leary showing there was a difference of opinion. He thought it would be better to refer the matter back to the Board of Works.  
Ald. Hore while he wanted the sewer he did not want it over the heads of the people and would not press for it if there was any way in which council could get clear of it legally.  
Ald. Touchburn understood that Mr. Pillike was willing to forego the tender if he was given other work.

**Reports**  
Mrs. Bolgers report for charity dispensers read and on motion referred to the committee on finance.  
The report of Market Clerk Callaghan for the month of July was read and ordered to be filed.  
Commissioner Chalmers report on the new fire hall with estimated cost was read and on motion referred to the committee on town property.

**Lindsay-st Roadway**  
Commissioner Chalmers submitted his report for work completed on Lindsay-st. The cost exceeded \$1,400.  
Ald. O'Reilly pointed out that the Commissioner could not be blamed if he was not furnished with proper appliances for road-making. If they did not supply a steam roller, he was not to blame. The juvenile alderman pointed out that there had been a loss of \$9 per day every day that the horse roller had been at work. It cost \$9 per day to use the antiquated horse roller, when an up-to-date steam roller could be utilized at \$5 per day. Then the latter would do more than double the work of the former. He had expected to find all this set forth in the street commissioner's report. He would like to see the report referred to the Board of Works so that these points could be brought out. While he modestly hoped the reporters would not notice his remarks he was free to say that he would urge upon the incoming council the wisdom of procuring up-to-date appliances for road-making even if they were unable to

expend a cent on the street for the next year.  
The report was referred to the Board of Works.  
**The Block List**  
Tax Collector Nichole submitted a statement in which the names and amounts of all in arrears for taxes for the year 1900.—Finance.  
**An Unhappy Expenditure**  
Auditor Eagleson reported he found the accounts for June and July correct with the exception of one or two minor items in the pay sheets, but could not find any authority for expending \$100 for keeping the river free of logs, and therefore had to report it an illegal expenditure.—Finance.  
**Reports**  
Ald. Jackson read report No. 25 of the Board of Works which on motion was adopted.  
Ald. Robson read report No. 16 of the committee on police and lighting which was also adopted.  
Ald. Hore read report No. 19 and 20 of the committee on Town Property which were also adopted.  
Ald. Jackson read report No. 22 of the Finance Committee which was adopted.  
**Music Hath Charms**  
Ald. Robson moved, seconded by Ald. Hore, that the chairman of town property be instructed to put a ceiling of tongue and groove lumber in the hall and also to report on exceeding \$3,000.
