Canada's Great Fair

Matters never looked more promising for Toronto Exhibition, to be held from Aug. 26th to Sept. 7th, than they do this year. Entries in all departments are good, while in live stock and manufactures they are well in excess of previous years.

The show of cattle is bound to be superior to anything ever seen in Canada before, a number of prize animals having been imported especially for Toronto exhibition at Toronto. The Right Hon. Sir Wilfred Laurier, Premier of the Dominion, on Tuesday, Aug. 27, will undoubtedly have the gratification of opening the best of the twenty-three successive annual exhibitions that will have been held at the capital of the province.

It will be thoroughly representative of the industrial arts, agricultural and horticultural products and general resources of this great country and will abound as well as instructive features. As becomes these warlike times the military will be much in evidence; arrangements having been made by permission of the General Officer commanding and the Minister of Militia for daily practice with Maxims and other guns by the Royal Canadian Artillery, and for various cavalry evolutions by the Royal Dragoons.

There will be the usual trotting, pacing and running races, balloon ascents by a man who escapes from a bomb that explodes a thousand feet in air, an entertainment of great variety in front of the grand stand, athletic sports, butter-making tests, jumping competitions, experiments in photography by wire, an international military tattoo on the opening night, the best dog show in America, lectures on the cultivation of the sugar beet, music by a score of the finest bands in America, and in fact more attractions and novelties than could be enumerated in a column of this paper, the whole being nightly crowned by a representation of the bombardment of the Taku forts by the allied forces in China, concluding with a brilliant display of fireworks. Canada's great Exposition will play second fiddle to no other.

MARIPOSA TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

Minutes of Regular Session Held Aug. 12

The council met at Oakwood on Monday the 12th day of August, members all present; minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

A deputation from Oakwood waited on the council with a desire to forward a system of drainage for the village. Mr. Hogg, Mr. Cameron, Mr. Thorndike and others addressed the council in the interest of the citizens of Oakwood and presented a petition signed by 33 owners of lands who would be interested in this matter. The council heard the request of the petitioners and proceeded to pass a general by-law enabling any community in the township to engage in a system of local drainage improvement.

By-law No. 521 was introduced by Mr. McKinnon and Mr. McCrimmon, providing the procedure in respect of drainage in the township of Mariposa as a local improvement under R.S.O. 1897, sections 6, 64 and subsequent sections of the Municipal Act, on motion was read a first, second and third time and passed.

Moved by Mr. Cameron, seconded by Mr. McCrimmon, that the petition of A. O. Hogg and 33 others respectively, owners of lands in the incorporated village of Oakwood and adjacent lands be received and proceeded with according to by-law No. 521 of this municipality.—Carried.

The clerk examined the assessment rolls and finds the petition referred to contains more than two-thirds of the number of names and more than one-half of the value of the property interested in the drainage scheme, as required by section 668 of the Municipal Act.

Moved by Mr. McKinnon, seconded by Mr. McCrimmon, that the petition of A. O. Hogg and 33 others reported on by the clerk, as appears by his endorsement thereon, be submitted to W. E. Yarnold, O.L.S., to be acted on under by-law No. 521 of this municipality.—Carried.

The council then took up the estimates for the ensuing year, when by-law No. 522 was brought in by Mr. McCrimmon and Mr. McKinnon, authorizing a levy of \$5567 for county purposes and \$3264.25 for a general school rate.

This by-law received the second and third reading and was passed, signed and sealed.

The trustees got in the requisitions for school monies, some in good time and one or two just in the nick of time.

By-law No. 523 was introduced by Mr. Cameron and Mr. McKinnon, authorizing a levy of \$5018.44 on the rateable property of the different school sections in the township for 1901, was received and read a first time.

On motion by Mr. Cameron and Mr. McKinnon, by-law No. 523 was read a second and third time, passed, signed and sealed.

It might be noted that the council are raising \$1000 less this year than last year for township purposes, but as the county rate is some \$800 higher and the school levies are some \$550 higher than last year, the taxes will not be materially changed from last year.

Moved by Mr. Cameron, seconded by Mr. Mark, that the reeve be authorized to sign an application for \$3000 insurance on the town hall, vault and contents in the Farmers' Union Mutual Fire Insurance Co., for three years from the 24th August, 1901, and that an order be given on the treasurer for the sum of \$19 in payment of the premium in favor of Peter Brown, agent.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Cameron, seconded by Mr. Mark, that the following accounts be paid: John Carew for 13120 feet of timber at \$13, \$170.-48; S. Washington, acct. for Reeder & Dorsey, \$17.22; R. Bryans & Co., acct. for sewer pipes, \$8.16; George Martindale, work on grader, \$61.24; Archie McEachern, grant in care of Robert Wells, \$5.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Cameron, seconded by Mr. Mark, that the clerk be authorized to levy rateably on the properties interested in the McArthur drain, the amount due the township by the McArthur drain account, and that said levy be made one-half in the year 1901, and one-half in the year 1902.—Carried.

Bexley Township Council

The Bexley township council held a regular meeting at the township hall, Victoria Road, on Thursday, Aug. 15th. A deputation from the county council composed of the warden and county councillors Bailey and Staback were present and addressed the council respecting the government grant in aid of public roads. Carden council and also members of Laxton council were present by appointment. After discussing the subject at considerable length the deputation retired. Nearly all the members of Bexley council were favorably impressed with the explanation the Warden gave, and it was moved by Mr. Benson, seconded by Mr. Simpson that the reeve attend if possible the adjourned meeting of the county council in September.

The circular letter from the Attorney-General asking the council to give its opinion of the proposed change in the Assessment Act was considered. Moved by Mr. Peel, seconded by Mr. Ferguson that it is the opinion of this council that the proposed change is not advisable, that the present law as regards the assessment of farm and village property is satisfactory.—Carried.

W. G. Peel was appointed pound-keeper in place of John Dalyn. The application of W. J. Chirpaw for a grant to the North Victoria Agricultural Society was favorably received, and a grant of \$15 was passed. A road grant of \$10 was made for the boundary of Fenelon grants an equal amount, James Ray commissioner.

Bylaw No. 350 was passed levying a rate of 20 mills in the \$ and a special rate on the school sections as follows: u. s. section No. 1 \$339.75; u. s. section No. 2, \$108.12; s. section No. 3, \$140; s. section, No. 6, \$90; s. section, No. 8, \$100; u. s. No. 9, \$95; u. s. section, No. 10, 80 cents.

Bylaw No. 351 was passed appointing Peter Finley collector at a salary of \$50. Motion was passed ordering the following accounts to be paid: J. C. Shields, acct. for supplying goods to James Louen family suspected case of smallpox, \$1.26; Dr. Grant's acct for attending same, \$10.70; Wm. Bailey for attending Jones family, scarlet fever, \$4; John Ham for goods supplied to Sheldon family, diphtheria, \$5.16; Joseph Wakelin, attending family \$4; R. J. Black, repairing bridge \$1.

Moved by Mr. Benson, seconded by Mr. Simpson that this meeting adjourn to meet at Cobocook on the 15th of December.—Carried.
