Judges of Live Stock.
Toronto, Aug. 13.—The idea of the Department of Agriculture to furnish judges for the live stock at the different agricultural fairs throughout the province promises to be productive of good results, inasmuch as fifty-eight agricultural societies have taken advantage of the offer. The fairs have been arranged in circuits of from two to three weeks and three judges will visit each fair. Before starting out on their circuits the judges will take a course of training at the Toronto Exhibition. In making their awards they will be supposed to give their reasons, in order that the exhibitor may be thoroughly satisfied with the decisions.

Niagara Power Dispute.
Toronto, Aug. 6.—The Niagara Falls Park Commissioners met at the Falls on Saturday and considered the questions in dispute between the Canadian and Ontario Power Companies. The commissioners will recommend that their agreement with the Ontario company be ratified, subject to a provision that the company shall submit to the Commissioner of Public Works detailed plans of their proposed construction. Then the Commissioner of Public Works shall act as referee between the two companies.
