Beat up the mixture thoroughly and use it while it is warm, rubbing it well into the scalp: Rainwater is so soft and satin-like that that is why it is recommended, for the hair abhors anything that impoverishes its vitality, so it should be sought for, especially in those parts of the country where the water is naturally hard, but if it cannot be obtained, borax should be added to the ordinary water soften it, or boiled water should be used. 

It is made of 48 grains of resorcin, one-fourth of an ounce of glycerine, and half an ounce of rectified spirit, and water to fill a two-ounce bottle. Or a dropper may be fixed instead of a cork into the bottle and a little sprinkled over the head, followed by a massage of the finger tips.
