GOVERNMENT IS SURPRISED

Mr. R. L. Borden Favors Development of the Intercolonial.

Likewise He Proposes Government Ownership of Railways at the Crucial Points of Various Existing Systems, Including C.P.R. Between North Bay and Fort William—in Six Paragraphs Outlines True Transportation Policy.

Ottawa, Aug. 19.—Government ownership over railways is the essence of the policy advocated by R. L. Borden in the House yesterday as a desirable alternative to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway scheme.

Mr. Borden next proposed that the Government should control that portion of the Canadian Pacific line between North Bay and Fort William, and make it a national highway, improve it and give all railways running rights over it.

Nationalize Mountain Pass. As to the far west, the leader of the Opposition declared in favor of a policy that would require the Canadian Northern Railway and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway to pierce the Rockies by the same pass.

Criticizes G.T.P. Scheme. The criticism offered the Grand Trunk Pacific scheme by the leader of the Opposition was strong and effective. The counter policy which he proposed was clearly defined and forcefully presented.

True Transportation Policy. Mr. Borden insisted that the objects of a transportation policy should be: (1) To secure the lowest possible rate in order that our people may obtain a portion as large as possible of the value at which their products were sold in our domestic and foreign markets.

Operator Had Headache. Kingston, Aug. 19.—The disastrous collision on Aug. 12 on the C.P.R., near Sharbot Lake, in which Engineer Hallihan and Fireman Forsythe lost their lives, was due to the awful mistake of Operator Worth of Arévalde station who, while dazed by a severe headache, told Dispatcher Ivory, at Havellock, that No. 54, a freight train, had not passed when it had been let through by himself.

Dropped Dead in Owen Sound. Owen Sound, Aug. 19.—Horace E. Crawford, K.C., a prominent lawyer from Winnipeg, dropped dead in his room at the King's Royal Hotel here yesterday. Mr. Crawford was the law partner of Hon. J. A. Campbell, Attorney-General for the Roblin Government.

Destroyed by Hall Storm. Moose Jaw, Aug. 19.—A destruction Tuesday night and damaged the section for 21 square miles. The estimated loss has not been figured out, but it will be in the millions.
