Trout Dam Burst

Thursday night of last week, owing in part to late heavy rains, the dam of the Brookdale Trout and Game Preserve Company, situated on the town line of Uxbridge, gave way and entirely emptied the pond of its contents. Fortunately, however, the valuable fish were nearly all saved by being carried by the flood to the lower pond. The bursting of the dam was fortunately discovered in time to save the destruction of the lower dam. Mr. A. J. Davis, of Port Perry, who is a member of the company, was at the club house, which is situated near the lower pond, and on being awakened and informed of the accident, was soon on deck, and with his son and the overseer of the company's property, succeeded in saving the lower dam, by removing a number of planks, and thus allowing the surplus water to escape. The dam that was destroyed, is in fact a roadway-a diverted road-it having lately been assumed by the county, and is controlled by the county, so that the loss sustained wall not be felt by the company.
