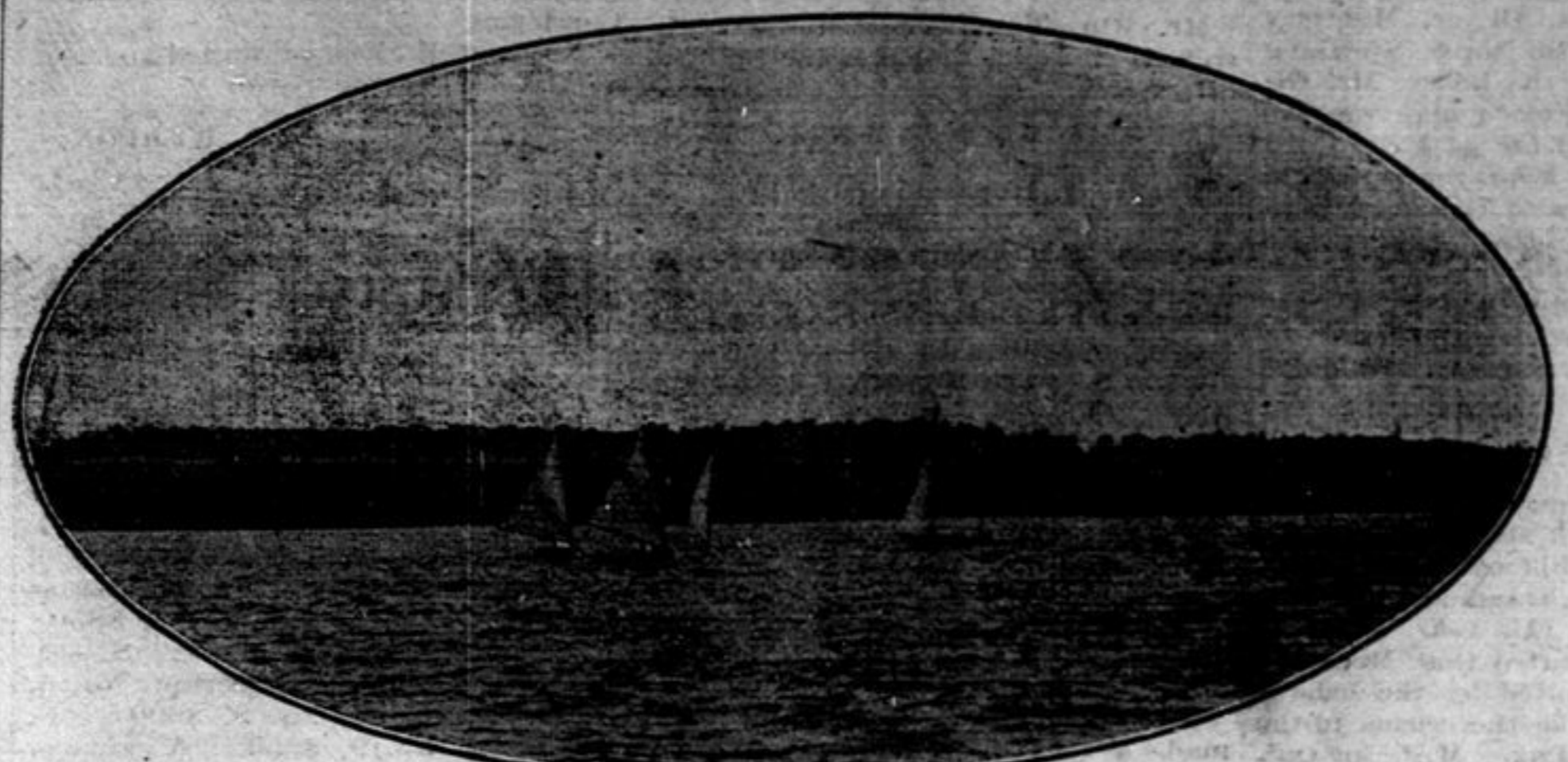

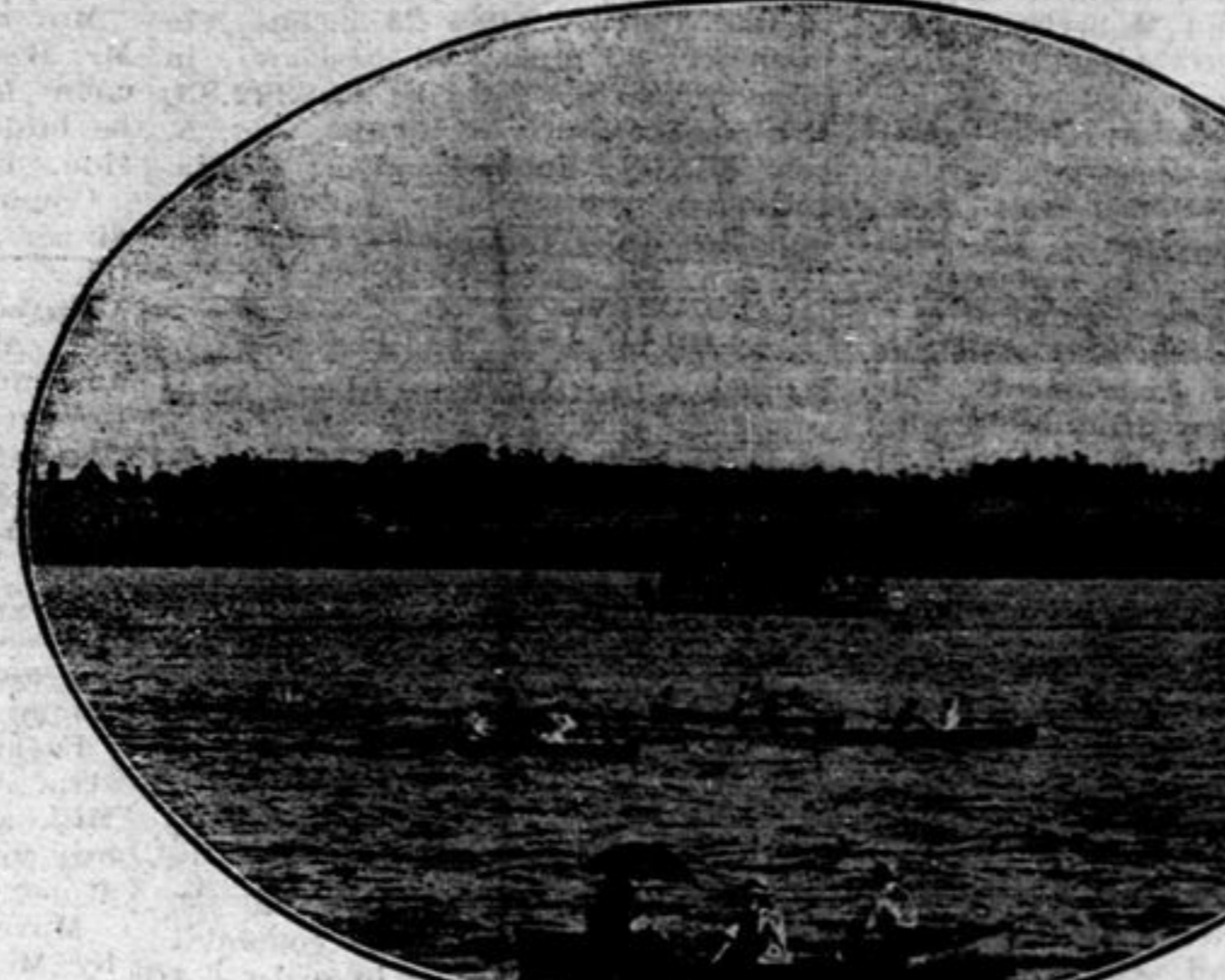

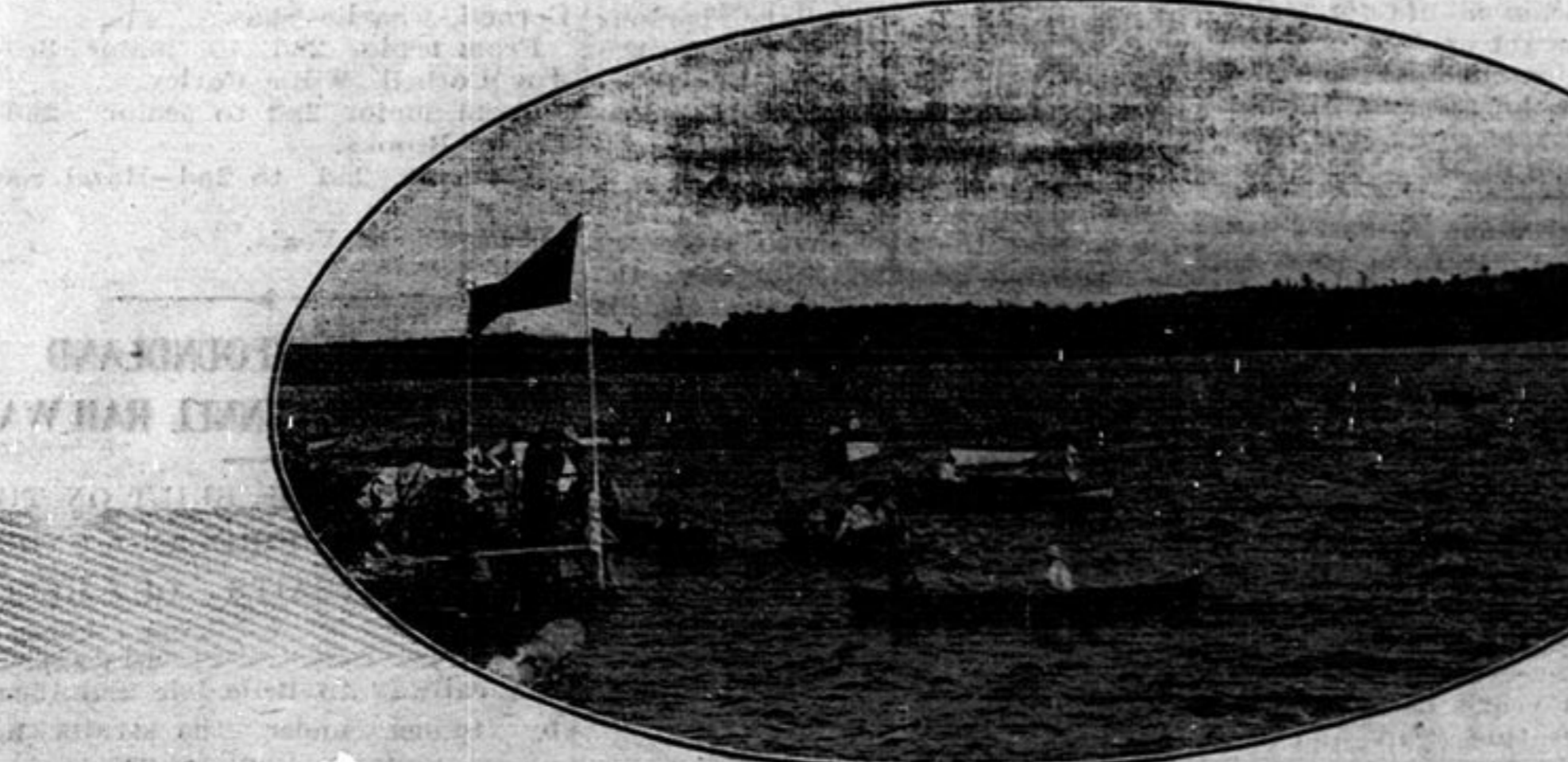

WANT TO APPREHEND MAN SOLICITING FOR WORLD. THE TORONTO WORLD FALSELY REPRESENTED BY J. E. RAY ALIAS J. G. GRAY—HE IS A SWIFT CANVASSER, AND GETS CASH.

The police are looking for J. E. Ray, alias J. G. Gray, who pretended to represent the Toronto World in Lindsay on Aug. 15, and took orders for premium subscriptions amounting to \$60 or \$70. The following day he took some twenty-five orders in Bobcaygeon aggregating \$75, and he also visited Fenelon Falls. Chief Nevison heard that he was in Cornwall on Friday, the 17th. The World has sent out warning that he is not a representative of that paper, and Chief of Police Nevison has sent out communication throughout this part of the Province, asking for his apprehension.

Deaths. BOYCE.—At 7 Cobourg Ave., Toronto, on August 8th, Margaret M., beloved daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. H. Boyce, aged one year and six months.

Supreme President. Mr. James Boxall, of Lindsay, was elected Supreme President of the S. O. E. B. S. at the convention in Chatham, Ont., which ended on Friday. Mr. Boxall is to be congratulated upon receiving this high honor from the organization which has become so influential. Mr. Boxall returned home on Tuesday.

EARTHQUAKE IN CHILE. An earthquake of great severity was experienced last Thursday evening in Valparaiso, Chile, 82 shocks being felt. The loss is enormous from the effects of the shocks as well as from fire which followed in a similar manner as the San Francisco disaster. Many shocks occurred in the next day, and the loss of life and property is great. The property loss has been estimated at \$250,000,000.

NEW BUILDINGS. The Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, boasts \$150,000 worth of new buildings this year, the principal of which is a fine new process building, in which a score of industries will be seen at work.

British Medical Association. The 74th annual meeting of the British Medical Association opened at Toronto University on Tuesday, Aug. 21, and is attended by many distinguished medical men from Europe and America.

Fire at Haileybury. The town of Haileybury was swept by fire on Monday night, which practically wiped out the business part of the town, the estimated loss being \$150,000. The fire started in McCabe & Stinson's store, and was undoubtedly the work of incendiaries.

The Price of Cheese Soars Victoria Boardings bring 12 7/8c

One Cent Higher than last August—Victoria Cheese takes Foremost Place—Estimate of what the sale means in Cash to Factories and Farmers

The Victoria cheese board met on Monday in council chamber at 10 o'clock, and the sale was highly gratifying to the factory men. The price at which the board was sold out was 12 7-16 cents, and there were 1521 boxes from factories as follows: Star 100, Cameron 60, Dunsford 110, Mariposa 108, Cambrey 73, Omeme 145, North Verulam 120, North Ops 85, Reaboro 150, Bobcaygeon 185, Maple Leaf 110, Palestine 60, Red Rock 155, North Harvey 60. The buyers were Mr. Gillespie, who bid 12 7-16 for selection, taking preference over Mr. Cook who bid 12 1/2 for the whole board; Mr. Brown, 12 7-16, and Mr. Flavelle 12 7-16. Mr. Gillespie, after calling Star, Dunsford, Mariposa, North Ops and Maple Leaf, 513 boxes, bid 12 1/2 for the balance of the board. Mr. Brown raised that bid 0-16 cent, and took Cameron, Cambrey, North Verulam, and North Harvey, 813 boxes. Mr. Flavelle then bid 12 7-16 cents for the balance, Bobcaygeon, Palestine, Red Rock, Omeme and Reaboro, 695 boxes.

House Boat's Initial Trip Lindsay to Sturgeon Point

The "Pocohantas" Towed by the "Marie Louise"—Party of Lindsay Men Enjoy the Trip, and Hospitality of Mr. and Mrs. McGill

Considerable excitement was caused at the Lindsay wharf on Wednesday evening when Mr. James H. McGill's house boat was towed up the river to that point by Baker & Bryans' "Marie Louise," to start on its initial journey to the lakes. The Esturion had just left her moorings to make the trip to Bobcaygeon; when the "Marie Louise" was seen steaming under the bridge, and the Esturion waited for the tug and house boat to come in. The size of Lindsay's harbor was tested, for at anchor were also the Manita and Kathleen. The house boat was brought to the landing and was boarded by gentlemen of Lindsay who had been invited to enjoy the trip to Sturgeon Point. Mr. McGill had intended to go to Bobcaygeon, but at the request of friends he decided to anchor at Sturgeon Point to be present at the regatta on Thursday. The party on board consisted of Messrs. G. H. M. Baker, J. G. Edwards, Jas. Graham, G. H. Hopkins, J. M. Squire, J. H. Sootheran, J. S. Plunkett, G. H. Wilson, of the Post, and J. P. Keough, of The Watchman-Warder. Mr. and Mrs. McGill proved a genial host and charming hostess. Luncheon was served on the journey, and a very pleasant time spent. Toasts were proposed to the boat and hosts and some time was spent in speech making. The guests were much delighted with the novel sail in the cool of the evening. The journey was made in about two hours and a half. The house boat is firmly built and perfectly balanced in the water, and with the steady strong pull of the tug boat, no more motion or vibration could be felt than if the boat were moored at the shore. Entering Sturgeon Lake, the boat was visited by several parties from the Point who were out for an evening sail. Anchored close to the shore nearly opposite the Flavelle bungalow, the house boat was a conspicuous feature at the regatta, and will remain at Sturgeon Point for about ten days. Mr. and Mrs. McGill will then go to Bobcaygeon, Lakefield and Peterboro before the season closes. The members of the party dispersed, some remaining at the Point, and some returning on the Marie Louise, all much pleased with the trip, and with best wishes for the happiness of the host and hostess in their floating summer home. The house boat is a tow of 120 or 130 tons, and the Marie Louise took it along with ease. The Watchman-Warder, two weeks ago, gave a description of Mr. McGill's house boat, and last week published photo engravings of it. The furnishings, as they are completed, are unique, and have every requisite for comfort and convenience. Mr. McGill has named it "Pocohantas." A rudder attached to the houseboat kept it from swinging to and fro in the river's winding course. The "Marie Louise" is one of the strongest tugs on the Kawarthas, and on this occasion was under the direction of Mr. G. H. M. Baker, of Baker & Bryans, the owners. The tug is very strongly built, and its powerful engine enables it to make fast speed. It is lighted throughout with electricity generated from a dynamo run by a little engine supplied with steam from the large boiler.

The Canadian Statesman, Bowmanville, this week, publishes the Watchman-Warder's description and cuts of Mr. James H. McGill's house boat, which has recently been built at Lindsay.
