

Cow Testing Associations

COWANSVILLE, QUE.

This table gives the result of the seventh test at Cowansville, Que., and shows a slight decrease of 2 pounds of fat on the average from the June test. With an average production of 582 lbs. of milk for all the 391 cows tested, there are four conspicuous herds with individual cows giving over 1000 lbs. There is plenty of room for more such individuals.

ST. ARMAND, QUE.

The fifth test at St. Armand, Que., gives a decrease of 2 pounds of fat per cow from the June test. Herd No. 15 has the excellent record for an 8 year old common grade cow of 1610 lbs. milk. She calved in May. The 10 year old common grade cow in herd 27, calved in March, also shows up well, with 1220 lbs. milk.

NORTH OXFORD, ONT.

The figures below give the result of the fourth test at North Oxford, Ont., with a shrinkage from June of 137 lbs. milk per cow. Probably, if the heat of July had been prepared for by mowing in the test sowing a supplementary soiling crop of peas and oats, the 1000 lb. average of last month might have been repeated.

CHICOUTIMI, QUE.

In the first test at Chicoutimi, Lake St. John District, the 154 cows average 718 lbs. of milk; thus the record of the best cow in herd 22, which is 1170 pounds, is an object lesson. If a few more cows gave 452 pounds above the average, what a general improvement would be made. That same 1170 pounds, cost is just 400 pounds better than the highest producer in herd 31. Average test, 3.7; average yield of fat, 27 lbs.

RIVIERE A L'OURS, QUE.

This first test in another of the Lake St. John districts associations, Riviere a l'Ours, opens with 112 cows and a rather low average production of milk and fat per cow, about three hundred pounds of milk per cow less than it should be. The highest individual yield of milk is 820 pounds in herd 14, nearly double the best yield in herd 8. What room for improvement. Average yield of milk 474 lbs.; average test, 3.8; average yield of fat, 18.3 lbs.

FRANKLIN.

This week will finish the harvest in this part, and the sound of the steam thrasher can now be heard from different directions. The grain is turning out well, with the exception of fancy peas, which are not doing well in this district.

BASS FOR LAKE SIMCOE.

Two car loads of parent bass were deposited in Lake Simcoe at Barrie a few days ago.

STANDARD BRANCH IN BELLEVILLE.
