COBOCONK TO HAVE A TANNERY. A company employing from ten to twelve men the year round, and many more than this number at certain seasons, is expected to locate at Cobocok this year. This is the W. J. Halliday & Sons Company tannery. This company has been located at Gamaoquo for some years past, but on their present lease expiring they expect to move to Cobocok. A site and water power has been secured from Messrs. Ham & Sons. Building operations for the tannery are to be commenced right away. The main building will be a three-story structure, 100 x 40 ft., and will be built of cement and stone. This enterprise will be quite an acquisition to Cobocok's industries.

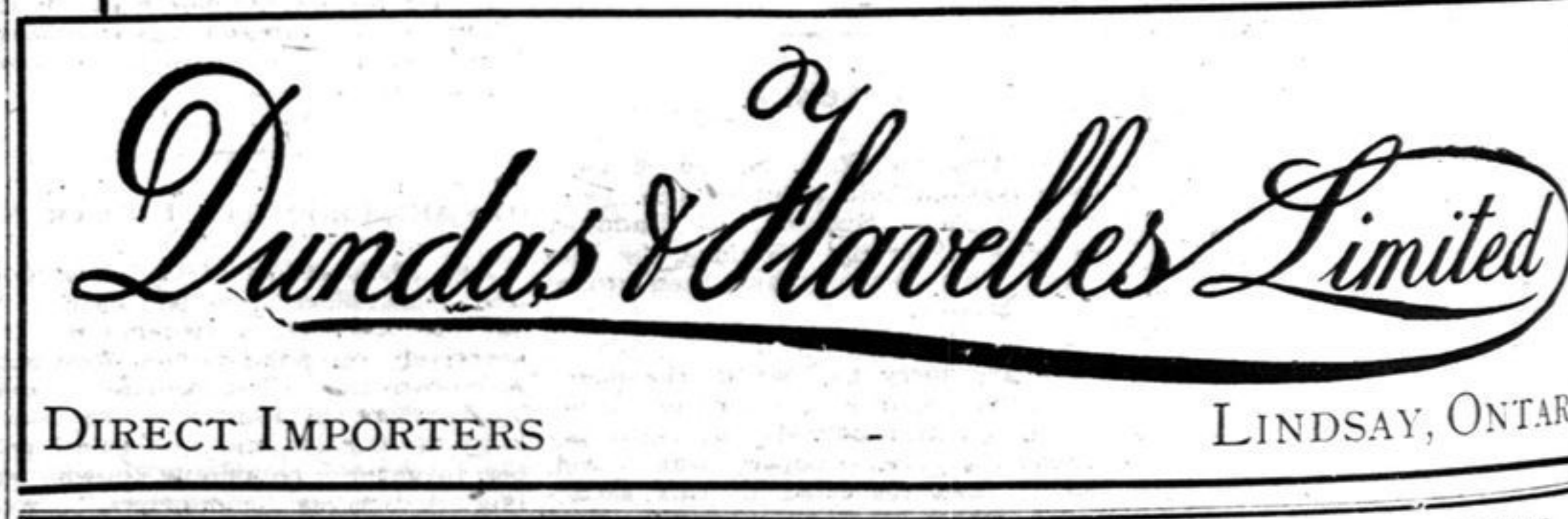

VERULM COUNCIL. The Council met in the council chamber, Bobcaygeon, on Wednesday, 21st, with the Reeve, E. Tiers, Esq., in the chair, and councillors all present except Mr. McFarland. A bunch of correspondence was filed and W. H. Thurston, J. B. Kennedy and W. Green applied for collector. On motion of Mitchell and Hetherington, J. B. Kennedy was appointed collector at a salary of \$60. Moved by Messrs. Hetherington and Brooks, that a by-law raising by way of loan, school debtures in the sum of \$1,100, repayable in ten years, was read a third time and passed. On motion of Messrs. Hetherington and Mitchell, the levy be at the rate of 4 1/2 mills for the current season, and a by-law was duly passed. Mr. Read, the Treasurer, reported \$152.35 on special deposit for railway debture No. 7. Moved by Messrs. Brooks and Mitchell, that the Reeve and Commissioner be appointed to inspect the bridge by Mr. Lawson's, and be authorized to enter into a contract for its immediate repair. Mr. Read reported the Treasurer overdrawn \$384.89, and that it would be necessary to borrow to carry on the business, so on motion of Messrs. Mitchell and Hetherington a by-law authorized the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow \$400 for three months was accordingly read and passed. Moved by Messrs. Brooks and Mitchell, that the action of the Reeve in having the Township Solicitor attend the appeals against county valuation be approved, and that the Solicitor be instructed to attend court on Sept. 10th, for the purpose of opposing the interests of the township. The Reeve reported that he and Commissioner Mitchell inspected the Thurston gravel pit at Dundas, and found very little gravel, and so full of stones that there was no prospect of gravel in paying quantities, and recommended that it remain for the present.

On motion of Messrs. Mitchell and Brooks, a number of accounts were passed and ordered paid. On motion of Mr. Brooks Council adjourned to meet on Tuesday, October 1st. Matriculation Examinations.
