New Filtration Plant is Now Under Way.

Howard Bridge, the inventor, and some of his assistants and a number of the citizens of Lindsay, turned the first sod for the necessary excavations and building for the installation of the ozone filtering plant of which the residents of Lindsay are already aware.

His Worship, after performing his laborious task, made a short address, in which he praised Mr. Bridge for his genius in inventing an apparatus that would give Lindsay citizens an abundant supply of absolutely pure and wholesome water.

There have been buried in its precincts 3724 bodies, of which 76 were Indians.
