How the Blind Read and Write
Accompanying his annual letter, in which he asks the readers of the Watchman to send him the names and post-office addresses of any boys or girls, known to them, whose eyesight is so defective that they cannot attend the Public Schools with advantage, Principal Gardiner, of the Ontario Institution for the education of the blind, at Brantford, sends us a card on which he has printed, without ink, the letters used by the blind in their reading. These letters are composed of raised dots or points, arranged in two horizontal rows, and the combinations of points that have been contrived to represent the various literary, numeral and musical characters are most ingenious. Point letters are much easier to read with the fingers than line letters, and blind children soon learn to read and write words, figures and music signs, the writing being done with a steel stylus and a brass frame which they call a slate. The School for the Blind is maintained by the Ontario Government as a part of our free school system, under the supervision of the Minister of Education, and the Principal will promptly answer any letter of inquiry concerning the school.

started the run on the bank," declared Mr. Dewart. "Those misrepresentations could only come true because of himself and his assistants. There is ample evidence to commit on the charge," he argued.
THE DEFENCE.
The defence as outlined by Mr. Thos. Stewart was that McGill had persuaded his friends to deposit their savings in the Farmers' Bank, and that, hearing certain rumors, he had become alarmed and had simply given his friends a warning. Coulter had also persuaded some of his friends to deposit in the bank, so he helped spread the alarm. They felt that having got the men to deposit with them that they would be blamed if anything happened. McGill had heard that the stock was away down around \$11 per share. The par value is \$100.
He also heard about an injunction that had been filed in Syracuse, N. Y., against the bank for \$150,000. Added to information that alleged that other branches were not doing well, McGill thought the institution was in dangerous shape.
McGill had decided that the depositors would blame him rightly if, having heard those things, he did not put them in a position to protect themselves.
"McGill, in good conscience, resolved that, having persuaded his friends to put money in the bank, and feeling doubtful as to the safety of the money, it was his duty to put the men out of that position. They put their money there through confidence in him, not through confidence in the Farmers' Bank."
"Men are not sent for trial who had no criminal intent," said Mr. Stewart. The reason they acted the way they did was because they were afraid the bank would fail. In the beginning of his address Mr. Stewart said: "I am not here to answer my learned friend's diatribes on Mr. McGill. Whether he acted with good taste or bad taste is neither here nor there. We all know that banks do things now that they could hardly have been persuaded to do ten years ago. It is the rivalry that exists at present which makes them do now what they would not have done long ago. It is a race for accounts now."
Mr. McGill had gotten along well with the head office. There was no disagreement.

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Several Cattle Killed.
The electrical storm of Wednesday night last caused considerable damage to crops in Carden township. It is also reported that several head of fine cattle on the ranches near the Duggan settlement in Carden were killed by the lightning.

Under Haystack.
Kingston, Ont., Aug. 5.—The body of Thomas Rudd, a former Kingston hardware merchant, but latterly in reduced circumstances, was found yesterday under a hay-stack on the farm of H. Armstrong in Lansdowne township. It was much decomposed. Rudd disappeared nearly two months ago.
