King George Postage Stamps.

Ottawa, Aug. 24.—It is understood that while in London, en route to South Africa, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux will confer with the British postal authorities in reference to the new issue of postage stamps necessitated by the accession of King George V. No date has yet been fixed for the issuance of the new stamps, but it is believed that an agreement will be reached by which new stamps will be issued simultaneously in the United Kingdom and the dominions and dependencies, probably in June next, the coronation month.

Cost of New Welland Canal.

Ottawa, Aug. 24.—A report is expected to be ready for the forthcoming session on the cost of the projected new route of the Welland Canal. A rough estimate places the cost at \$50,000,000. This would provide a 21-foot waterway. It is pointed out, however, that would be only the beginning. In connection with the scheme it would also be necessary to deepen the St. Lawrence canals.

Canucks' Low Tender.

Albany, N.Y., Aug. 24.—Bids were received yesterday for one of the most important contracts on the barge canal, involving the reconstruction of the locks at Lockport, N.Y. The lowest bidder was Larkin & Sangster of St. Catharines, Ont. The bid was \$1,149,478, as against the state engineer's estimate for the work of \$1,390,880. There were four other bidders.
