CAN YOU VOTE?

BE SURE AND BE PROPERLY REGISTERED.
Those desirous of registering as voters in the coming election must possess the following qualifications: "Every person of the full age of twenty-one years, a subject of His Majesty by birth or naturalization, and not disqualified under the Ontario election act and not otherwise by law prohibited from voting shall be entered on the list of manhood suffrage voters for the polling sub-division in which he resides. All such persons must have resided in the province for twelve months preceding the date of the first day in which the registrars of manhood suffrage hold their meeting. Students at universities and colleges may register if they are not already registered."
