ABOUT THE WEST

In conversation with Ald, Newton Smale who has just returned from a three months' visit to the a Warder representative gleaned some aluable information as to the conditions in the wheat belt. Ald. Smale spent most of the time Saskatchewan and had an opportunity of visiting the principal settlements in that province.

He states that the crops give great promise, being very heavy but that the season is late and it is still un certain as a frost would do untold harm. In his opinion the harvest would not be general in Saskatchewen until week from Monday and he stated that previous to his return. the arrival of large number of harvesters for whom there was no en ployment, was causing a great deal of concern in the cities as most

the harvesters were without momen The weed, pest, he stated, was be coming very evident in some localities but where good methods were used and the land kept clean this was being overcome. Ald. stated that of course wheat was the leading crop but flax was a good second, there being in Saskatchewan this year an increase of 100 per cent. in the acreage devoted to flax, the farmers finding it a good paying proposition. Of course, in a country where agriculture was the principal industry everything hinged on the crops, so that everybody was interested either directly or indirectly and the crops was the subject

discussion everywhere. Ald. Smale stated that there was over a million and a half morefacres under cultivation in Saskatchewan this year and judging from the amount of new breaking being done this year the increase will be much greater. The wet season, he ex plained, had enabled the breaking to continue right up to the present time and many of the big engines would unhitch from the plows on to the threshing separators. In many districts the breaking is done by big power plows at a price of from \$4 to \$5 an acre, the gasoline engines

Ald. Smale said that a half sec tion of land was regarded as the smallest farm which could be worked economically and many farms ran up into several sections. A large number of the farmers in the Regina district, he explained had in flax

alone more than 1000 acres. New towns are springing up everywhere, as on all the new railways a 'town, as they are called, although most of them would be considered only as villages in Ontario, is found every ten miles. Most of these con sist of a station, a couple of el vators, a few stores, and a number of houses, making what is called town in the West, but these are ne cessary for the transmission of grain. There was a great chance for the young man out West if he was willing to go into the new district and undergo the hardships of pioneer life
