### ASKING FOR INCREASE.

A special effort is being made to obtain an increase of wages for crossing flagmen employed by the G.T.R., C.P.R., and C.N.R. These men are exposed to all kinds of weather and all one of them receives is \$1.30 a day in wages, out of which he must pay from \$18 to \$20 a month for insurance. At least that amount he never sees, because it is deducted from his wages. "It's pretty hard," said one of the men, "to keep a family on such wages when the cost of living is so high and going higher." Their case will be taken up by the local labor leaders and heads of the railway brotherhoods, who will appeal to the Minister of Labor with the hope that he may be able to influence the railway authorities to improve the condition of the men. The usual reply of the railway officials, when these men ask for an increase or someone speaks for them, is: "Well, we don't want their very bad and just put them at their jobs because they are getting old or they have been injured in the company's service."
