250,000,000 BUSHELS. Edmonton, Alta., Aug. 6. - Fiftyseven thousand five hundred harvest hands, in addition to those now on the ground, will be required in the prairie provinces to gather this season's crop. This is 11,000 more men than were required last year. It is estimated that the wheat crop alone will be fully 250,000,000 bushels. Most of the extra help wil be sent into the field between August 10 and 15 and the cutting should be in full sway about August 20.
