BOURASSA.

When will Ontario newspapers learn that Henri Bourassa represents nobody but himself? He has been a disturber and an irreconcilable from the first day of his advent in Canadian politics. Like his grandfather, Louis Papineau, he seems to feel charged with a mission to set the French of Quebec in array against the powers that be. One moment he tells them that they are to be impressed into the British army, and that their bones will whiten the sands of Africa. Another, he fulminates against the recognition by Canada of any duty in relation to the British navy. Another, he declares that the French language and the Roman Catholic religion are treated with more respect in the United States than in Canada, and betrays a leaning toward annexation.

Long ago Sir Wilfrid Laurier found he could not get along with Bourassa, and virtually made him do his worst. Since then he has angled for some degree of intimacy with the leaders of the Conservative party, but in that quarter, in turn, his overtures have been received with indifference. Now he has begun a series of diatribes against the Borden policy of immediate assistance to the British navy and eventual representation in an Imperial council. This is not to be regretted. The sooner he broke with Borden the better. No political party could carry such a hornet. Perhaps now, even so jaundiced and purblind a partisan sheet as the Toronto Globe, which continually harps on the alleged coalition of the Quebec Conservatives and the Nationalists, will credit the denial that there were ever any relations beyond those of civility between them.

One cannot but wonder that the Roman Catholic church does not repudiate Mr. Bourassa's tactics in its interest. Radical as he is in politics, he is Ultramontane in religion. Like Merle he cannot conceal his dream of a Canada essentially French Catholic from end to end, and completely dissociated from the destinies of the British Empire. But the more he blusters on that line, the more firmly are welded the forces against him. Surely the astute authorities of his church cannot fail to see this.
