The Central, after crossing the Island of Montreal from the eastward, crosses the Back River a short distance above the C.P.R. bridge, and traversing Jesus Bridge to St. Boniface, a second bridge of considerable length crosses Thousand Island River, thence northward to Hawkesbury, where the company have running rights over the Canadian Northern bridge. A few miles more and Mc-Alpine is reached, where the initial contract has been subdivided, and five or six subcontractors are at work. A spur will run from South Indian to Ottawa.
