Sudden Death of W. H. Simpson At Cobourg

(From Friday's daily). Shocking and distressing news was received here last evening from Cobourg when it was learned that Mr. Wm. H. Simpson, proprietor of the Simpson House, Lindsay, had suffered a paralytic stroke, and that it was feared that he would not recover.

Mr. Simpson visited Cobourg Thursday in company with Mr. John Carway, Mr. Herb. Williamson and others, and it appears that owing to the large crowds attending the horse show the hotels were crowded, and it was with difficulty that the visitors were waited upon.

Mr. Simpson was at once removed to the Cobourg hospital and three doctors were summoned, who waited on him during the night. Immediately after receiving word of his father's illness Mr. A. G. Simpson motored from Lindsay to Cobourg, arriving there late last night.

LATER (2.30 o'clock)-Word was received in town this afternoon that Mr. Simpson died at Cobourg about 2.20 o'clock p.m., despite the assistance of three medical men and the kind attention of nurses.

The news of Mr. Simpson's very sudden demise will be received with deep regret by the citizens of Lindsay. Almost every person in Lindsay and surrounding country knew "Billy" Simpson, as he was familiarly called, and he was widely known in other towns and cities.

For many years past the deceased had been a sufferer from rheumatism, but despite this ailment he was apparently strong and healthy, and previous to going to Cobourg on Thursday stated to a friend that he was enjoying good health.

The late Mr. Simpson was a native of the city of Peterboro, where he was born about 56 years ago. He afterwards moved with his parents to Bobcaygeon, his father having conducted the Forest House for a number of years.

The late Mrs. Simpson, mother of the deceased, Mr. W. H. Simpson and his brother, Mr. Geo. A. Simpson, (who passed away on Feb. 12, 1912) moved to Fenelon Falls, where as proprietors of the Mansion House they became closely identified with village life and gained an excellent reputation, the Mansion House (now the Twomey hotel) ranking as one of the best in the county.

Left to mourn his loss is a loving wife, one daughter, Miss Mary Simpson, and one devoted son, Mr. A. G. Simpson. Mrs. E. H. Dunham, of Montreal, is a sister, and Mr. J. J. B. Simpson, of Vancouver, B.C., a brother.

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ONCE LIVED HERE.

Mr. Edward J. Hayes, of Peterboro the man who was instantly killed in the lath mills of the Peterboro Lumber Co., last Monday morning, at one time lived in Lindsay. Mr. Hayes, who was foreman of the lath department, was engaged in putting on an 18-inch belt on a two-foot pulley by the aid of a rope, when he became entangled in the rope, which was too long. He was dragged between the face of the pulley and the belt and was horribly crushed, death having no doubt resulted instantaneously from shock, the upper part of the body containing the vital organs being practically uninjured.

Tuesday forenoon, two sons of the late Edward Hayes went over to the mill and gathered up the rope which happened to be the innocent cause of their father's untimely death and drew a piece of the belting which drew the unfortunate man into the wheel. Mr. John Thompson, the superintendent of the company, who happened to enter a few minutes after, ordered the young man not to take the articles away. The older brother made a coil of the rope and gave it to the younger, who ran away with it. Mr. Thompson at once phoned the police and followed in their buggy, finally securing both the rope and the belt. They did not state what their object was in taking the articles. In view of the inquest Mr. Thompson desired to have nothing molested.

Why Ontario Farm Help Go to West

A large number of farm hands in Ontario have given notice to their employers of their intention to take advantage of the cheap harvesters' excursion rates to go West. According to immigration officials, Ontario farmers have been in the habit of reducing wages soon after harvest time and not increasing them again until spring. The help have "got wise" and rather than accept the lower wage, many prefer to try their fortune in the West.

As a result there is always a scarcity of farm laborers in Ontario during harvest time and this year promises to be no exception. It is further pointed out that the \$10 fare to Winnipeg is a big attraction. So urgent is the demand for farm hands, that already a large number of farmers from the territory immediately around Toronto have called at the Dominion Immigration Offices in quest of help while numerous applications from all parts of the Province have been made by letter.

SAPPING LIFE OUT OF RURAL ONTARIO

Barrie Saturday Morning: The mail order houses, insane speculation, and the trek to the West are the three great influences which are sapping the life out of the rural sections of Ontario. But there will be a reaction some time. The rural population will wake up some day to the conclusion that it is about time these things should stop.
