He long served under the French colors, taking part in twenty-eight campaigns, was twice wounded and has been decorated for bravery on the field. He draws a veteran's pension of \$15 a month.

Slack Barrels Made In Canada Worth Millions of Dollars

Canada is fast losing her possibilities as a producer of tight cooperage is brought out by statistics compiled by the forestry branch of the department of the interior. These show that whereas 2,768,000 oak staves were cut in the Dominion in 1911, 7,298,000 were imported.

If the manufacture of slack cooperage, such as lime, potatoes, apples, dry fish, flour, cereals, etc., which predominate in Canada's products. Elm is the principal wood employed, forming over 50 per cent. of the total consumption. Spruce is rapidly coming into more general use as a source of stave supply, eleven million more spruce staves and nine million fewer elm staves having been used in 1911 than 1910.

When elm is exhausted birch will probably take its place, birch being comparatively flexible and available in great quantities.

The total value of the materials used in the slack cooperage industry in Canada for the past year was \$1,965,762. In 1910 it was \$1,595,119 or some \$370,000 more. Imports and exports of materials and finished product were, respectively, \$329,992 and \$135,463, an excess of imports over exports of \$194,529.

The total amount of material used according to an estimate of the forestry branch, was over 62,000,000 feet, board measure. Through checking, loose methods of manufacture, etc., there is also a great deal of waste not accounted for.

WILL NOT GET A HEARING

Tribunal Adjourns Without Roosevelt's Evidence

Washington, Aug. 26.—Col. Roosevelt will not have an opportunity to answer John D. Archibald's statements before the Senate committee investigating campaign expenditures until late in September.

Senator Clapp, chairman of the subcommittee, of which Mr. Archibald told his story of having contributed \$100,000 to the Roosevelt fund in 1904, telegraphed Col. Roosevelt at 4 o'clock yesterday morning that the committee would not be able to hear him to-day at the college he visited.

Late yesterday Senator Clapp received a telegram from Senator Dillingham of Vermont, chairman of the committee on privileges and elections, announcing that Senator Pomeroy of Iowa would be appointed to take the place of Senator Luke Lea of Tennessee, who has resigned on account of the illness of his wife, who is in Colorado. Senator Pomeroy is now in Ohio, however, and Senator Clapp said he applied for Pomeroy to bring the subcommittee of five together before the end of September.

Was Eager to Go
Oyster Bay, Aug. 26.—Col. Roosevelt announced last night that he wanted to appear to-day in Washington before the Senate committee investigating campaign contributions, to rebut the charges of John D. Archibald on Friday morning concerning his knowledge of an alleged contribution of \$100,000 by Mr. Archibald to the Republican campaign fund of 1904.

"I have wired Senator Clapp, chairman of the committee," Col. Roosevelt said, "that I would like to appear before the committee on Monday."

At the time Col. Roosevelt made this announcement, he had not received a reply from Senator Clapp to his telegram, but had arranged to leave Oyster Bay for Washington in time to appear before the committee to-day. The colonel's telegram read: "Senator M. E. Clapp, Washington: As I am unwilling that Mr. Archibald's statement about myself should pass without immediate official contradiction, I request the privilege of appearing before your committee on Monday. My engagements are such that it will be the greatest inconvenience to me, and to many others, if the hearing is deferred to a later date."

(Signed) Theodore Roosevelt.

Col. Roosevelt carried the dust of a day in the open when the correspondents found him at the accustomed hour at Saratoga Hill last night. He had spent the day rowing on the bay and picnicking with his family, and had returned but a short time before.

"It is a most unheard of thing," he said in commenting on Mr. Archibald's testimony and his departure for Europe, "that Mr. Archibald should depart without testifying about the \$25,000 he gave Senator Penrose. It is a most peculiar thing that the committee should allow him to depart without so testifying. There are no dead men concerned in that transaction. He could be sure of what he was testifying to in that."

"I do not want a day more than necessary to elapse without placing on the record my testimony," a report that Mr. Archibald had intimated before sailing from New York last night that he might sue Col. Roosevelt for libel was mentioned to the Progressive party nominee.

"All right," said Col. Roosevelt, "he won't have a chance after I have testified."

Col. Roosevelt is especially desirous of refuting that portion of Mr. Archibald's testimony in which Mr. Archibald said that the late Cornelius N. Bliss had told him that Col. Roosevelt knew of a contribution of \$100,000 by Mr. Archibald and appreciated it. The colonel declares that Mr. Bliss told him of no such contribution. Moreover, he (Col. Roosevelt) made public written instructions which he had given Chairman Cortelyou of the National Republican committee at the time of the reported contribution by the Standard Oil, that if the report was true the money be returned at once.
