Less Butter and Cheese Exported

That Canada is dropping out the butter export trade is the effect of a report to the trade and com merce department by J. E. Ray, commissioner at Birmingham. Ten years ago 13,000 tons of butter went Ottawa Valley from Canada to England. Twelve months ago it fell to 776 tons. There was not sufficient Canadian butter on the London market to se an official quotation. The situation is attributed to increasing home consumption.


