CAUSED BY IRON IN BLOOD. Conquest and iron go together. And red hair is caused by a super-abundance of iron in the blood. The color of hair is due to a pigment which has been called melanin, which is secreted in the roots of the hairs. Absence of this coloring matter makes white hair. Melanin is formed by oxidation. A variety of organic compounds may undergo oxidation into melanin pigments ranging in intensity from yellow to black; the greater the oxidation, the darker the product. And iron, when oxidized, inside the body as well as out of it, produces red. This explains the freckles that so often mar a red-haired woman's beauty. Red hair is hereditary.

## A BELT LINE

ONE ADVOCATED AROUND CORPORATION OF LINDSAY. Lindsay's paved streets are the talk of town and countryside, townsmen and country men being of the one opinion that the work should have been undertaken years ago, and that the money being spent to build permanent roads is being well spent. The paved thoroughfares are the popular streets for pleasure traffic, and in fact for heavy teaming, and we find farmers driving blocks out of their way in order to skip the bad street and have a trot over the pavements.

Automobilists, bicyclist and citizens owning private turnouts are delighted with the manner in which the town council are pushing and extending the general paving policy. Many have suggested that a belt line be built around the town, on the following streets:

On Bond-st. to Cambridge; thence Cambridge north to Colborne; Colborne east to William-st.; William over present paved road to Wellington-st.; Wellington-st. east to Lindsay-st.; Lindsay-st. south to Glengale-st.; Glengale-st. west to William-st.; William-st. south to Melbourne-st.; Melbourne-st. west to Cambridge-st.; Cambridge-st. north to Glengale-st.; Glengale-st. west to Albert-st.; Albert-st. north to Kent-st.; Kent-st. west to Adelaide-st.; Adelaide-st. north to Bond-st.
