Mrs. P. N. Murdoch of South Verulam, met with a bad accident on Sunday, 17th inst. She was returning from church, accompanied by her daughter and Mrs. Sheriff, the three being in a buggy. The horse got fracious, kicked the dashboard, and turned the occupants into the ditch. The daughter got off safely, and Mrs. Sheriff was only badly shaken, but Mrs. P. N. Murdoch broke her arm. The lady is not as young as she needs to be and a broken limb is all the more serious.

Mr. W. S. Milliner of Spencerport arrived in Bobcaygeon Friday, for a few days fishing. In the afternoon he and his wife went out fishing with guide Alf. Edgar, and returned with a monster maskinonge. It weighed 24 pounds. Mr. Milliner was more than tickled with his prize, and the fish was the admiration of the guests at the Rockland. This is Mr. and Mrs. Milliner's first visit to this place, and naturally they are greatly delighted with their outing on the Kawartha Lakes. The fish are biting exceptionally good for this time of the year. Miss Florence Ramage, had a glorious time catching an 18 lb maskinonge. The fish measured from head to tip of tail, 40 inches. Mrs. Ramage had the fish sent to Oil City, her home, as a sample of the Kawartha maskinonge. She also caught several others that weigh from five to ten pounds. Mr. Ramage succeeded in landing a 16 pound maskinonge Thursday, while out with guide Claes Arfberg. Not as good as his daughter's by two pounds.—Independent.

Another shocking accident occurred at the Huntville Lumber Company's mill on Saturday morning, 16th instant, when Wesley Langridge, aged about 16 years, lost his left arm in an endeavor to adjust a belt on a running pulley. Young Langridge was connected with the lath department

of this mill and was generally regarded as a careful fellow about the machinery. About 11 o'clock Saturday while the machinery was in full operation, Langridge attempted to connect a belt with a pulley running at full speed. It is said that he did not even take the precaution to use the stick provided for the purpose. The cleave of his shirt caught between the belt and pulley and dragged his arm in, breaking it in five places and tearing away the muscle just above the elbow. The machinery was quickly stopped and the unfortunate boy carried to his home about a hundred yards away. Dr. J. W. Hart and assistant were telephoned for and after examination found that amputation would be necessary. The arm was amputated close to the shoulder. It is stated by old employees of the firm that the feat attempted by Langridge was a most dangerous one and would not be risked by men of 10 and 15 years experience.

Word was received at Woodville during the week of the death at Tintern, on Wednesday night last of Mrs. Theresa Gowanlock, who will be remembered as having visited for some time during the past few months at the residence of Mr. J. D. Gilchrist. Deceased was made prisoner by Big Bear previous to the Northwest rebellion and held for two months. She never recovered from the cruelties to which she was subjected during her captivity with the Indians. Her husband Jno. A. Gowanlock was killed in the Frog Lake massacre. Since 1885 Mrs. Gowanlock has been a frequent visitor to Woodville and the news of her death last week was received here with sincere regret. It is doubtful if another woman in Canada would have been able to stand the severe shock to which Mrs. Gowanlock was subjected at the time when her husband was shot down by her side and she was thrown into an Indian camp to suffer the many hardships that must necessarily follow, and the fact that she has been able to stand the shock thus received for the past fifteen years is evidence of a strong constitution.
