Our local fair took place on Wednesday. There was a good show and a good turnout, and everybody interested was pleased and happy.

It is expected that there will be a large number of residents avail themselves of the Manitoba's cheap trip on Saturday to visit the Bobcaygeon fair. That town always puts up a good bill of attractions and draws a good crowd.

Messrs. Brandon, McDougall and Austin are rushing business this summer in all the many branches of their extensive firm, particularly in the cattle buying department. Last week they shipped 8 car loads of cattle, sheep and lambs to Buffalo and two car loads to Toronto. This firm buy and ship more cattle than any other east of Toronto and are one of the principal factors of the business of our village.

Some weeks ago we mentioned in these columns the large day's work done at the stave factory of Messrs. T. H. DeCew and son, in cutting 45,000 staves in ten hours. But on Saturday last this record was broken by the cutting of 63,300 staves in nine hours. The firm and employees were all equally pleased with the work and the greatest praise was given Mr. P. F. Clarke who is considered one of the best stave cutters in Ontario. Mr. DeCew treated his employees, to the number of 45, to cigars on the strength of the day's work. Saturday completed a month's cutting on apple barrel staves, during which time 1,200,000 staves were cut. This firm is one of which our village has reason to feel proud.

On Tuesday Miss Robson entertained a number of friends on the Dauntless. The party visited the peat works in Eldon and passed a most delightful day. This is one of the many pleasant water parties of the season.

One of the attractions of our fair was the millinery opening of Mrs. J. A. McDougall. The show room and window were handsomely draped in velvet and velours and the display was one which would have graced a city establishment. The store was thronged throughout the day and all visitors expressed themselves in terms of highest admiration. Among so many beautiful creations it is difficult to particularize, but a toque in pastel green with draped crown and brim and trimmed with pastel sequins was very beautiful, while a chapeau in purple plisse was another gem. A turban in automobile velvet with black sequin crown was very striking, and one of the most handsome chapeaus was composed of black sequin and white silk velvet crown, with black velvet corded brim, and trimmed from the back with a stiched bow and ospreys. The members of the water commission met in regular session on Monday afternoon, at G. H. Hopkins' office.

Secretary Hopkins read a further letter from the G.T.R. about the water contract. While still dissenting decidedly from the commission on that matter, the company was willing to let it stand until a thorough discussion could be had at an early date. Commissioners were emphatic that the town must be protected. Pres. Faville favored living strictly to the old contract until its expiration. The amount of water used should be found out and all the excess of 85,000 gallons per day, charged extra. After the expiration of the contract a new one on a proper basis should be made.

Mayor Smyth—we would have to put on a meter to find out what is used.

Pres. Faville—Yes.

Manager B-gie—Two would be necessary as there are two distinct mains drawn from.

Pres. Faville—The company gets water from us for less than they pay lease.

Sec. Hopkins—Make a flat rate charging \$1500 by by law.

Pres. Faville—I would not favor a flat rate.

Mr. McNeill—Not at that rate. Belleville gets three times what we do.

Mr. Brady—How would you charge for the excess of 85,000 gallons per day?

Sec. Hopkins—The contract says the charge must be in the same proportion.

THOSE IN ARREARS
Out of 300 takers, 8 are in arrears. Their names were read to the meeting and it was decided to discontinue payment was not made. Definite action was deferred till the next meeting.

ANOTHER BIG SERVICE
A request has been verocally made by Mr. G. H. M. Barker for a rate for giving service at the Rathbun mill. It is required for boiler washing etc. The manager had estimated the actual cost of using it in at \$400. The service was favored on condition that the usual bond to take enough water to at least pay for the fire considered.

ITEMS OF BUSINESS
Wah Lee asked for a reduction of water rates that could not be granted.

Father Laurent applied for a water service to drive a small motor for the new oven at St. Mary's. It was granted at \$15.

Messrs. Woods and Cooper have an overground pipe for lawn purposes. They applied to have it put underground. It will be done if they agree to take water enough to warrant the expense.

The secretary pointed out that a limit must be put to that procedure. It would make too big a drain on capital. Only immediately profitable services ought to be encouraged.
