share of the Cambridge-st sewer. The people between Adelaide and Angeline are not paying the 8 cents a foot and if the sewer is built past their land they will escape paying for their share of the Cambridge-st sewer into which they drain. We had better adhere to the Chipman plan.

Ald. Touchburn—There is nothing in what you say. We are not changing the Chipman plan but extending it.

Ald. Jackson—We will not let the contract till we are sure.

No Use Petitioning for Walks

A petition from people on Francis-st and another in that region for granolithic was left over for this year. That for a 7-foot walk from Russell-st to the station was referred to the commissioner for his report. Aids. Jackson and O'Reilly favored referring the others also but their colleagues were opposed because these walks could not be built this year.

Ald. Robson—Some people on the outskirts asked for 2-board walks before this. They should get attention.

It was agreed that no outside cement walks should be more than 4 feet wide. Ald. Touchburn said petitioners should pay 60 per cent. of the cost and the town 40 per cent. instead of the reverse as it is now, and that Peterboro pays only 25 per cent.

The commissioners promised Ald. Robson that the stream at Sylvesters should be covered between the culvert and walk next day. The commissioner's report on the Kent-st sewer was adopted and a motion by Aids. Jackson and Hore said that since the M. H. Officer, the Board of Health, and two-thirds of the council were in favor of the sewer, it should be built.—Carried.

Ald. Touchburn said that the 7 per cent. charged for oversight on contracts should be charged to property-holders when the town commissioner does the work. His colleagues objected.

At this point the mayor was about to give his opinion on the matter when a tagless hound that had watched proceedings from the rostrum all evening got under the throne and begun a boisterous attack on the nimble parasites around his ears. This he kept up until dislodged by a few vigorous kicks from His Worship.

Then were the reports of committees read.

The King-st Drain

Over on King-st a new piece of permanent road is being made. The side drains are united at the junction of King and Lindsay-sts. The single drain there formed crosses 120 feet of private property and discharges into the river across from the wharf. Ald. O'Reilly insisted that the commissioner had made a mistake. The river could have been reached by going 60 feet and on the street all the way. That course should now be taken before the permanent road was made there. Ald. Touchburn vigorously opposed it but was beaten at the vote. Ald. Sinclair suggested that Commissioner Chalmers should pay for the drain put across private property.

At this point (it was 10.25 o'clock) Ald. Robson rose in an anxious way besought the attention of the mayor, and thus addressed his fellows:—We are out of order; all this is unconstitutional. It is after 10 o'clock. We should not be careless. Ald. Touchburn remarked that if the aldermen would keep still the business might be done before the legal time had expired. Another colleague placated the merchant legislator by explaining that the hour at which a motion of extension was required had formerly been 10 o'clock but was now 10.30. The alderman then moved the extension.

Between that hour and 10.50 it was decided to give Driver O'Neil two weeks holidays, if he got a substitute; to ask the G. T. R. for gates at the crossings of Kent and Lindsay-sts; to ask Mr. A. W. Campbell to come down next week and see about the King-st road; and advertise the Court of Revision for the William-st granolithic and Kent-st sewer. Ald. Robson tried to get the billiard parlor matter brought up but a motion to adjourn was carried.

## A NEW YANKEE SUMMER RESORT

A Year-Old Place that has Beaten its Older Rival—Something About Both of Them

It is said that faith can move mountains; money can move towns, and there are more examples of the latter on record than of the former. The case with which capital performs its task is as astonishing and captivating as the feat itself. In fact it is done at long range, during other operations, and without any outlay on the end attained. This process is the most interesting known example of killing two birds with one stone.

An interesting instance of this seemingly difficult task may be seen across Lake Ontario south east from Toronto in New York State. Until this season the boat running to that region landed at a place called Wilson. There were the piers. There came the trainloads of tourists from the south. The life and business of a popular summer resort and transfer place for those journeying over-lake were the pride and prosperity of Wilson. They are not today. They are six miles further east where Olcott Beach, that year-old summer resort proudly overlooks the lake. Money did it. The Buffalo Traction Company decided to build an electric railway from that city to a point on the shore of Lake Ontario. They chose Olcott Beach as that point. The road was built and by its construction Wilson was practically moved to Olcott Beach. The docks and breakwaters are there at Wilson and still, and the hotels and railway station but there are no boats at these docks and the multitudes and business that made those hotels and that station worth while are over at Olcott now. Last summer the steamboat captains at Toronto and other lakeports unmoored their vessels and cried "All aboard for Wilson." This years that exhortation terminates with Olcott Beach and from the deserted wharves of the former town its citizens look wistfully at the great tourist-crowded boats go toiling obliquely past to their young rival, a little distance down the shore. And so has the glory departed, a text been provided for an homily on the uncertainty of earthly greatness, and an example furnished of how money can move a town.

Why the Buffalo Traction Company chose Olcott Beach rather than Wilson, the company very likely knows, but it is a puzzle to the casual visitor. The latter is a charming place. It lies on a level plain and on either side of a small river that enters the lake an eighth of a mile from the town's centre. There are the docks and the most picturesque harbor along that shore. Years ago a neck of land curved ambitiously out from the western mainland as if to forbid the union of the lake and river. It terminated in a sort of promontory covered with trees. Between them lake and stream have cut through the isthmus and now that promontory is a picturesque island protecting a charming lagoon from the turmoil of the lake beyond. Among its moss-covered rocks and foliage nestles a small hotel, and secure in its protection, all sorts of small crafts skin over the placid waters. One of the hotels up town is kept by a native of Fenelon township. He is Mr. Henry Brock, who 25 years ago was a lad at Cameron. His greeting to a visitor from Lindsay showed that he had not forgotten his native country. The local and remaining tourist trade gives Mr. Brock a good business.

Olcott Beach is not as pretty a place as Wilson. It can scarcely be said to have any natural beauty at all. To reach the docks one has the choice between several rods of deep sand or the same distance on the railway ties. Those docks are on an exposed shore. So much is this the case that on one occasion at least when a north wind was blowing the boat was held at Toronto a couple of hours to avoid reaching Olcott before daybreak. But the Traction company have more money and they will make it attractive. In a brief time they have made good headway. An hotel sight was bought for \$30,000 and several times that amount spent on the building and its surroundings. It is a very fine structure and it stands in what is already a very pretty park. The rates at this hotel are from \$10 to \$15 per day and for obvious reasons a description of its accommodation and bill of fare will be omitted from this article.

Olcott Beach is destined to be an important summer resort. Already the Traction Company's cars carry large numbers over their line that runs out from Buffalo 40 miles away. This season the route of another electric line from Rochester 60 miles further east has been surveyed and the new summer resort is on the way to success. No liquor licences are granted but a thirsty man can always find relief.

## THE BOER DESCRIBED

Part of a Former Valentia Man's Letter from South Africa

The Canduff (N.W.T.) Gazette publishes a letter from Trooper W. Shoull dice of the Constabulary in Africa. He was formerly a Valentia man and some of his relatives are there now. Part of the letter is as follows:

The Boers are coming in every day and surrendering. They are tall and looking crowd. They are tall and slim; they do not shave; they walk smartly but hang their heads, and their complexion is burnt almost to a copper color with the sun. They seem practically ignorant of the outside world, and it is pretty hard to convince them of what things mean in a civilized country. They want a lot of flattering.

The men appear to have very little love for their women. The insurgents live in the mountains and plunder by night and wreck trains. To show how the Boers look at things you will remember that President Kruger would not allow electric cars to run in Johannesburg, because he said horses would eat more hay than the electric plant.

The Boer women are rather good looking; they are fair complexioned, and dress neatly, but like the men their demeanor is sullen. The Boers behave like a man who has had a big law suit and got beaten. The Boer women were very badly treated by their husbands who went away and left the women to starve. Nothing but starvation will bring the Boers to time. The country is vacant. I only saw one piece of plowing in 1500 miles.

## Growing Wheat in Ontario

Mr. John H. Brock of Oxford county writes to the Farmers' Advocate as follows:

"Shall Ontario farmers continue to grow wheat? I believe they will for many years hence. My reasons for this belief are: Scarcely a year passes that crops yielding 25 to 35 bushels are not harvested in some sections of the province.

Ontario wheat possesses certain qualities which no other wheat possesses. It is true it does not produce as good bread-flour, used alone, as does Manitoba or Kansas wheat. But it is far superior as a pastry flour. Manitoba-wheat flour is quite unsuitable for the making of biscuits and buns, which is no unimportant factor in the products of flour.

The soil of Ontario is, I believe, as well fitted for wheat as the soil of Manitoba or Kansas; but it is older, and in many cases more worn-out than most of the prairie fields of the West, and must be built up by the growing of clover, the application of farmyard manure or special fertilizers and a rotation of crops. I believe that the prairie soils will wear out as quickly as the soil of Ontario has worn out.

The Hessian fly is now perhaps the worst menace to our wheat-growing industry. The fly has made its worst ravages in this section of the province, as the crops are not one-third what they should be. Late sowing in fall has been tried, with little or no success.

I believe the fly will flourish for some little time, but will disappear as quickly as it came. This has been its history of the past.

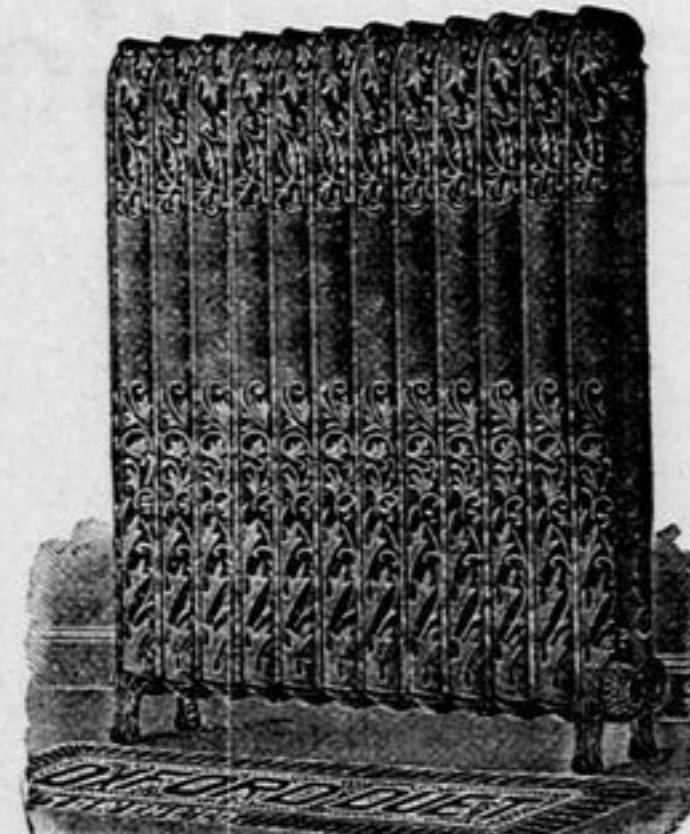
