SOUTH AFRICA YET IN DANGER

There are Grave Fears That the Dutch Sentiment Will Prevail

CAPE LEGISLATURE DUTCH

Gen. Brabant Says Britain is in Danger of Losing All She Has Gained

London, Aug. 31.—There were two notable events in the Cape Parliament during the past week which will have an important bearing on the radical crisis in South Africa. Both come at a most opportune moment for the Boer leaders in Europe in their struggle with the British Government for concessions toward rehabilitating their people.

The first is the decision of the Cape Legislature to appoint a commission of its own to take evidence and report on the operation of martial law in the colony throughout the war. The second, which is perhaps more significant, is Dr. Jamieson's assumption of practical leadership of the Opposition to the Ministry of Sir Gordon Sprigg, with the immediate suspension of the constitution as a policy.

The effect of each of these steps is to make deeper and clearer the alignment of the forces of the Afrikaner Bond, which is now master of the Parliamentary situation in the colony, the remnants of the Rhodes party, and the so-called Progressives.

The appointment of the commission is a distinct challenge to Colonial Secretary Chamberlain, whose own commission on the same subject, composed of Lord Chief Justice Alverstone, Judge Bingham, and Major-General Sir John C. Ardagh, will begin to hear evidence in the colony next week. Despite the prominence and standing of these men, it is already obvious that it is the Parliamentary Commission alone which will enjoy the confidence of the Cape Dutch, who were chiefly affected by martial law.

BOND LEADERS SMILE

The appearance of Dr. Jamieson as a party leader can only be said to mark the present barrenness of Cecil Rhodes' political heritage. The appearance of the leader of the famous raid in the centre of the political stage at this juncture is one of those things that make the Bond leaders rub their hands and laugh. It will surely save them the trouble and expense of electoral canvassing.

For Mr. Chamberlain, however, it is a more serious matter. His refusal to suspend the constitution was conditional on the good behavior of the Cape Parliament. But, however troublesome the politicians in their Boer sympathies at the Cape have now become, it is out of the question that Mr. Chamberlain should take his orders from Dr. Jamieson.

The Boer leaders in England with their astute political manager, Delegate Abram Fischer, will certainly not fail to use their political advantage. Precisely what they seek, besides money and an understanding of the question of education, is not yet known, but their claims will probably appear more reasonable to Secretary Chamberlain when he remembers the radical commission in South Africa by reviving all the angry passions of the last three years and looks at the spectacle of Dr. Jamieson as a loyalist leader.

General Brabant, the commander of Brabant's Corps during the fighting in South Africa, sailed yesterday for the Cape. Speaking of the political situation, General Brabant expressed the opinion that it was not satisfactory. He added: "We are in danger of losing everything we gained by the war."

STRIKERS IN ITALY

They Cut the Gas Supply in the City of Florence—6000 Troops Out

Florence, Italy, Sept. 1.—The employees of 40 different callings have joined the strike which began last Friday. The town appears to be in a state of siege. Six thousand troops have been recalled from the manoeuvres, and every square in the city is occupied by a company of soldiers. Strong infantry and cavalry patrols are parading the streets and suburbs. All meetings and processions have been forbidden, and hundreds of suspected persons have been arrested.

The strikers include the gas and tramway employees, and they have committed several acts of vandalism, cutting gas pipes and attempting incendiarism. Arrangements have been made for fifty tons of bread to be brought daily into Florence from outside the city, and nobody will be allowed to purchase more than two pounds at a time. The troops are slaughtering animals to provide meat. The water supply of the city is assured. Owing to the cutting of gas pipes certain portions of Florence are now lighted with torches. The cafes are closed. The population condemn the strike as out of all proportions to the small question involved. It is estimated that 40,000 men are idle. The municipal newspapers have ceased to appear as a result of the strike.

Certain workmen who were repairing the belfry of the English church, on Minchilli street, refused to join the strike. The strikers thereupon threw petrol on the building and set it on fire. The flames were extinguished before serious damage resulted.

The jails are filled to overflowing. Large numbers of prisoners have been transferred to neighboring towns.

TWELVE HUNDRED HORSE POWER ELECTRICITY FROM THE FALLS

The Present Plant at Fenelon Falls Will be Duplicated This Autumn

"The Light, Heat & Power Company will duplicate their Fenelon Falls power plant this fall," said Manager Reesor. "We now have 750 horse power of water in use there. From that we develop about 600 horse power of electric energy; for you know it does not do to have your water wheel and generator the same power. That is to say the wheel must have a little reserve power behind it to do good work. When we duplicate the plant we shall have 1500 horse power of water which will give us 1200 of electricity.

We shall not be able to have the duplicate plant in till December. The firms from which we must get our supplies are so busy that we cannot get our orders filled. Some time ago I went to Toronto to see about getting a generator and the Canadian General Electric people said they could not let me have it before six months. I went straight to Peterboro to see the manager of their works, which are in that town. He said, after hard coaxing, that he would try and let me have it in five months but could not guarantee it. Even the bolt works have more than they can do. We wanted a few thousand for bolting the cross arms onto our poles, and could not get them for a couple of months. It seems as though Canadian industries are in a very prosperous condition.

Three weeks ago he and his wife went east on his vacation. His employers were astonished to hear he went to Niagara Falls, New York, Philadelphia and Saratoga, but they thought his habits so good they supposed he had been saving all year for the trip.

In Saratoga, Colomb went broke on the races. Mrs. Colomb pawned jewelry valued at \$300 for enough to pay their fares home.

Louis Colomb, father of Sidney Colomb, was the central figure in one of the most sensational bank scandals and embezzlements ever known in New Orleans. Mr. Colomb was of an old Creole family, had served with distinction in the Confederate army, and was universally esteemed as a man of courage and honor. He held a minor position in the Union National Bank of this city, being one of the two bookkeepers.

When the United States bank examiner came here to inspect the accounts of the Union National Bank he discovered that the bank had been robbed of between \$400,000 and \$500,000. It was a long time before the mystery was cleared up, and it was then discovered that the robbery had been committed by Colomb and Leefe, with the assistance of confederates on the outside. When the marshal came to arrest Colomb, the book-keeper took poison and died in a few moments.

BRUTAL CAVALRYMEN

They Wantonly Ride Fine Horses to Death
The following is descriptive of the international cavalry races, held last week between Brussels and Ostend, a distance of 82 1/2 miles:

After passing the 62 1/2 mile point the hardest part of the ride began, and the affair developed into the severest kind of an ordeal. Many horses fell exhausted. Three of the animals dropped dead before Ostend was reached. When near Ostend the French lieutenant, Bauzil, who noticed that his horse was dying, drew his revolver and blew its brains out. The only English officer in the contest, Lieut. Gibbon, saw his mount was exhausted, and dismounted while the animal panted away.

The scene at Ostend, when the Hungarian, Lieut. Madamet, riding a Frenchman thoroughbred, came in first, was one of great enthusiasm. The horse died soon after the victory. The second, third and fourth at the finish were all Frenchmen. Then came a Norwegian, a Dutchman and a Belgian.

The time of the winner, Lieut. Madamet, for the entire distance, was six hours and twenty minutes.
