KILLED BY C. P. R.

Imperial Limited in Collision at Grassett -No Passengers Hurt.

Grasett, Ont., Sept. 1-The Imperfal Limited, on the Canadian Pacific, met with a very serious head-on collision three and a half miles west of here, at 8.30 o'clock vesterday morning, caused by a light engine and caboose in charge of Conductor Charlebois, who overlooked his instructions and did not sidetrack as directed to allow the limited to cross him.

### WAR IS INEVITABLE AGAINST OSLER, M.P.

Bulgaria and Turkey Bound to Fight in the Course of Time.

EVENTS WILL FORCE THEM.

Revolution Is Spreading-Fifteen Thousand Insurgents Are Under Arms-General Rising This Week-Famous

Leader, Sarafoff, Assumes Control in the Salonica District -Villages Burned.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Sept. 1 .- Both in official and revolutionary circles the opinion is freely held that war between Turkey and Bulgaria is imminent and can be averted by nothing short of a miracle. It is not expected that either government will formally delare hostilities, but that the prevailing conditions will force a

Up to 6 o'clock last evening Prince Ferdinand had not arrived in Sofa, and the court officials declare that they are without information as to his movements.

General Rising This Week.

Sofia, Sept. 1 .- The Macedonian leaders claim that an aggregate of 2,000 Bulgarians have crossed the frontier in small parties joined the insurgents during the past ten days. Gen. Zondieff, the president of the Macedonian Committee, and Col. Jankoff, one of the revolutionary leaders, who are now in Macedonia, send word that the insurgent forces number 12,000 to 15,000 men. They expect that a general insurrection will be proclaimed this week. Turks Occupy Klissura.

Salonica, Sept. 1 .- The Turks have occupied Klissura, Albania, without resistance. A number of Bulgarian villages in its vicinity were burned. Inspector-General Hilmi Pasha recently sent a communication, composed of five Christians and five Turks, to offer amnesty to the insurgents on condition that they lay their arms before the great fast today in honor of the Sultan's corona-

The revolt has become general at Cassa and Yenidje, twenty-five miles from Salonica, and is spreading to Gherghli and Tikhvesh, sixty miles from Salonica.

Sarafoff, the revolutionary leader has arrived in the neighborhood of Salonica for the purpose of directing the movements in this district. Some Turkish officers, Aug. 29, sold fifteen cases of Martini rifles and a quantity of ammunition to Bulgarians.

Traced to London Town.

Aden, Arabia, Sept. 1 .- The principal sources for the supply of rifles and ammunition to the Mad Mullah's forces in Somaliland have been traced through a complete identification of trade marks by agents at Harrar and Jibutil, Abyssinia, to a London firm. Since the commencement of the operations in Somaliland an aggregate of 3,000,000 rounds of Lee-Metford rifle ammunition and correspondingly large number of Lee-Metford and Gras rifles have been shipped by this London firm to Jibutil and Harrar, by way ed to-night. of Manchester and Marseilles.

Wm. Guertin Drowned. Ottawa, Sept. 1 -On Saturday at noon at the Cascades, on the Gatineau, Wm. Guertin of River Desert, aged twenty, lost his life. When dinner bell ran ten men got into one boat with Guertin. The boat struck a rock, swung into the swift current, and was swamped. Guertin was the only one drowned, the others being rescued.

Reduced Wheat Freight Rates

Winnipeg, Aug. 31 .- (Special) .- For ten cents per hundred pounds, or six cents per bushel, wheat is now carried from Winnipeg to Port Arthur over the Canadian Northern Railway. An equal reduction in rates goes into effect to-morrow at all other points on the Canadian Northern in Manitoba. This makes a total reduction in rates secured by the Roblin Government on grain alone of four cents per hundred within three

E. A. James, Gen.-Supt. of the Canadian Northern Railway Company, interviewed, he said: "The new rate fixed by the Order-in-Council of the Provincial Government wil go into effect to-morrow (Tuesday) morning, All of our agents were notified this afternoon."

Killed by a Train.

### THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC.

Mr. Scott's Speech During This Debate Was Enlivened by His Statement That Osler, M.P., Was One of a Body of Grafters Who Cleared \$15,-000,000 Out of Late Government Concessions.

Ottawa, Sept. 1 .- When the House resumed yesterday morning Sir Wilfrid Laurier answered the question on the order paper in the name of Mr. Bourassa, as to whether Lord Minto had represented the opinion of his advisers, or was he speaking on his own responsibility when he addressed the recent banquet at Montreal, on trade matters. Sir Wilfrid's reply was: "His Excellency attended the banquet as the guest of the Montreal Board of Trade, and in answer to the toast expressed his own personal views.'

Dr. Sproule (East Grey) drew attention to a despatch stating that anthrax had broken out in a herd of cattle west of Chicago. He said that as there were large shipments of western cattle sent through Canada over the Grand Trunk Railway he desired to draw the attention of the Minister of Agriculture to the possible danger that existed.

Mr. Thomas Murray, of Pontiac, followed Dr. Vroman and spoke for the Government in the railway debate yesterday morning. In reply to Col. Hughes, he said, that he was retiring from the House of Commons, but not to the Senate.

Charge Against Mr. Osler, M. P. That Mr. E. B. Osler, M.P., was one of a body of "grafters" who cleared \$15,000,000 out of concessions by the late Government to two western railways was the charge made in the House last night by Mr. Walter Scott, the member for Regina.
